Narrative

Describe a moment in your worshipping community's recent ministry which you recognize as one of success and fulfillment.

Recent Adult Education opportunities include Bible study two Sundays per month, "The Art of Listening" led by a former hospital chaplain once per month, the lay-led 'Nooma' film and discussion series featuring Rob Bell, and regular lay led Bible studies by a seminary-trained lay person during the week. Well attended Advent and Lenten programs.

Describe your liturgical style and practice for all types of worship services provided by your community.

8:00 am service is Rite I. 10:30 am service is flexible. Experimentation with Rite II has occurred, most recently in the Advent & Lenten Seasons. Music is a large part of this worship service. There is a highly regarded Director of Music Ministries, and a growing choir and bell choir.

How do you practice incorporating others in ministry?

Faithful volunteers from core membership provide leadership to a number of church activities. Lay readers, acolytes and ushers support each service. Members of the congregation lead Adult Education, Sunday School, Altar Guild, Hildegards, and Pastoral Care activities for the Church Community.

As a worshipping community, how do you care for your spiritual, emotional and physical well-being?

Men's Bible Study group meets for breakfast once a month on Saturday mornings, Hildegards is a womens' spiritual growth group also meeting once a month on Saturdays. These groups and a newly commissioned Chapter of the Order of St. Luke sponsor periodic retreat and quiet days for the community. There is also a Parish Nurse who works with the Pastoral Care Team, takes blood pressures once a month, visits the sick, writes regular articles for the parish newsletter on health related issues.

How do you engage in pastoral care for those beyond your worshipping community?

Pastoral Care Visitors are active with 90% lay participants, and 10% clergy support. Pastoral Care teams visit homes, nursing homes, and hospitals. Different teams meet together for communication, feedback and support.

Describe your worshipping community's involvement in either the wider Church or geographical region.

Member of P.U.N.C.H. (group of seven neighborhood churches), hosting/staffing Salvation Army dinners, CareLink (rent assistance within the neighborhood), J2A Mission Trip to Scotland, ongoing relationship with South Dakota Native American community, individual mission included Habitat for

Humanity, and neighborhood revitalization program, a diocesan ski trip and "Happenings" weekend for youth. We make our facility available to a local high school for their musical events, and an opera night with professional vocalists..
