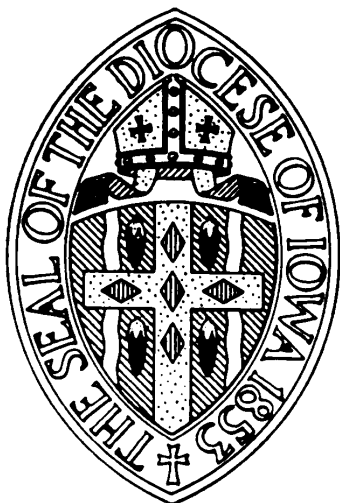

Province VI

Exerpt from a letter from Ellen Bruckner, Coordinator, Province VI

Canceling the Provincial Synod this year has led the Provincial Council to begin some "soul searching". There are several reasons for canceling Synod including:

- Most of our dioceses are, as are many others in the Church, facing major resource questions and reallocations. Most of us have to ask the difficult questions concerning the use of finances, "is this really worth what we are spending?" The cost of travel and other expenses associated with face to face meetings continues to climb.
- Many of us are also dealing with shrinking populations which affects the people who are available for meetings that require several days.

I am also under the impression that most of the people in our dioceses do not know what a province is or what it does and how it benefits them personally. The question about benefits to the dioceses is not just at a personal level, but also on a programmatic level, "What can the province do for us?" Therefore there is little interest in committing resources to the province.

These are some tough issues and the Council has set up a time in November to wrestle with these questions and more that have been raised from the wider church.

The 2012 Synod will be dedicated to preparing the General Convention Deputies for the General Convention in June of 2012. We are hopeful that each diocese will send all of its General Convention Deputies to this 2012 Synod. Four of our dioceses use their General Convention Deputies as Synod Delegates, which makes some sense, since these are the people who have had the experience of General Convention and know what needs to be brought back to the dioceses and how we can work together provincially on some of the issues. Four of our dioceses [Iowa is one] elect delegates to Synod who are not General Convention Deputies which would mean the Deputies from these dioceses would not have the opportunity for the orientation, or it could mean that these dioceses send quite a few people to Synod. This may be a time for these dioceses to have some conversation around this issue and try to determine the best way to get as many deputies to the Synod as possible. It is our thought that this issue might impact diocesan budgets and therefore needs to come before diocesan convention/council meetings. It may also impact how a diocese selects people to serve at the provincial level. The underlying desire of the Provincial Council is to build and nurture the connections between the dioceses and the wider church. There are ways we can support each other in the ministry to which God calls us as individuals and as dioceses.

Disciplinary Board

Effective July 1, and in keeping with the Title IV canon revised by The General Convention in 2009, the Diocese of Iowa created a Disciplinary Board from the membership of the former Court for the Trial of an Ordained Person Not Being a Bishop. Members of the Disciplinary Board met for a day-long training and orientation to the new process, with diocesan chancellors Tom Carpenter and Linda Neuman at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul.

Ms. Kris Leaman (Mason City) agreed to serve as President of the Disciplinary Board; other members include: Mr. William Early (Harlan), The Rev. John Horn (Burlington), The Rev. Sharon Mahood (Des Moines), The Rev Carl Mann (Spirit Lake), Ms. Margaret Tinsman (Bettendorf) with terms ending with Convention 2011; and The Rev. Alice Haugen (Iowa City), The Rev. Jean McCarthy (Des Moines), terms ending with Convention 2012. Ms. Julianne Allaway of the Bishop's Staff was named Clerk of the Disciplinary Board. The Rev. Canon Glenn Rankin currently stands as Intake Officer for the diocesan process.

Title IV is an ecclesiastical process, not a legal process. The new canons seek to present the core values of repentance, forgiveness, healing, amendment of life, reconciliation, and justice.

Chemical Dependency Task Force Patti Christensen

During the past year the Chemical Dependency Task Force has maintained a network of both laity and clergy who are ready and willing to assist local churches with their substance abuse needs. We are available to the substance abuser and his/her family members and/or concerned persons.

We can be reached by (1) A phone call to the Diocesan Office, where the Bishop's Administrative Assistant will contact a Task Force member in the vicinity. (2) Direct phone contact with Task Force members, whose names and numbers have been published in this journal under the committees and commissions. All callers may/will remain anonymous. Diocesan policy prohibits any recriminations upon those seeking help with chemical dependency.

The Task Force has continued to sponsor two annual retreats-one in April and one in October for those in recovery and for those who are concerned. Those who attend are mainly unchurched or of other denominations. We see the Spirit of God working evangelistically in the lives of those attending through the love, hope, and acceptance this church offers via these retreats. The committee underwrites the cost of the retreat in order not to have money deter anyone from attending. The registration cost is \$60.00 per person. We have scholarships available through the Frank Davis Memorial Fund for anyone in need so no one is turned away because of the inability to pay.

Prison Ministry

Anne Williams

The Episcopal Diocese of Iowa has numerous locations where ministry to those affected by incarceration is carried out. There are individuals and groups in all areas of the Diocese to whom this ministry is vital. Some are visiting our state and local prisons and jails while others are engaged in restorative justice ministries and ministries to the victims of crime and the families of the incarcerated and in ministries that hope to intervene in the poverty-crime cycle.

There are Episcopalians engaged in active prison ministry in at least seven areas of the Diocese – in the Linn County Jail (Maridee Dugger), Story County Jail (Don Payer), Blackhawk County Jail and Jeremiah House in Waterloo (Chuck Lane), Fort Dodge/Rockwell City (Peg Jackson), Mitchellville Women's Correctional Facility (Carol Kramer), Buena Vista County disadvantaged youth (Don Keeler), Anamosa State Penitentiary (Melody Rockwell, Dick Church, Dan Rockwell, and Anne Williams). In addition, there are many others who provide on-going religious support to the incarcerated who are members of their individual congregations.

Commission on One World, One Church

Mr. David Oakland, Convener

The work of OWOC falls into two general areas headed by our Global Missioner, the Rev. Melody Rockwell (Christ Church, Cedar Rapids), and our Ecumenical and Interreligious Officer, the Rev. Jean McCarthy (St. Mark's, Des Moines). Each has submitted a report of activities in their areas.

Six International Development Grant applications were received and five were funded. Funds were allocated to (1) Swaziland Neighborhood Care Points (\$2000), (2) Oral Health in Swaziland (\$1000) [tooth brushes, tooth paste], (3) Swaziland Healthcare Volunteer Workshop (\$1000), (4) Common Hope in Guatemala (\$2900) [Loving Parenting Initiative], and (5) Hope & Peace, International (\$1000) [New mothers and babies in Nicaragua]. The Rev. Judith Jones, Ron Noah, and Paul Meginnis reviewed the applications and brought a funding recommendation to the Commission. The sixth request was for more than three times the budgeted amount and showed little in terms of how it would be used. That prompted a second recommendation: that we refer to this program as "International Development Mini-grants". Both recommendations were adopted by OWOC. The Board of Directors approved the title change at their September 2011 meeting.

The Nzara Discernment Committee includes several members from the OWOC Commission. That work does not fall under our umbrella but is of interest to the Commission as recommendations come forward. A significant portion of our block grant has been set aside to assist two members of the committee in visiting Nzara as part of the process. Their discernment will likely generate some ongoing discernment within OWOC on specifics of existing relationships with Brechin and Swaziland.

At the time of writing, the Swaziland Healthcare 2011 team is in the final stages of preparation for a three-week trip to Swaziland. There were to be two primary foci: dental/oral health clinics primarily for children and assessment of the work of the Neighborhood Care Points in their feeding programs and home-based care activities. The visit is to conclude with a one-day workshop for volunteers from the Care Points – both the cooks and the home-based care volunteers – to encourage them in their work and to do some teaching related to nutrition, oral health, and home-care. The team will report on their work at the Convention and will have updated information on the availability of food in Swaziland.

I am one of many who have affection for the Diocese of Brechin and have had the good fortune to visit there. Dean Jeremy Auld, Dean of St. Paul's Dundee as of January of 2010, and his wife Christine and their two sons gave us royal hospitality in May of 2010 when the Rev. Mel Schlachter and I visited them in Dundee. Since then, Bishop John Mantle has died and Nigel Peyton has been elected his successor. His consecration is October 8. This means that both the Dean and the Bishop are new to being companions with Iowa and Swaziland. How good that so many people in this diocese have visited Brechin and have relationships with people or parishes there. In the months to come I hope to hear from you and hear how you are connected now.

In the Diocese of Iowa the Three Rivers Chapter in the Eastern Corridor has instituted an annual "Celtic Fest" to fund raise and fun raise. Our immediate purpose is to raise money to assist Dean Auld and his family visit Iowa in 2012 for the Summer Ministry School & Retreat and other related experiences in the Diocese. Christ Church, Cedar Rapids, has an active chapter of "Companions of Brechin," and is eager to make more direct connections. It is our hope that in 2013 Ellen Bruckner and I will lead a pilgrimage to the Celtic sites of Scotland and to Brechin. We are also hopeful that beyond that there will be mission trips of youth and adults moving both ways across the Atlantic.

Commission on Stewardship and Planned Giving

Mission Statement: To strengthen the Diocese of Iowa through offering its congregations development and support to use the gifts God has given us, to do the work God is calling us to do.

The Stewardship Committee met 6 times since the last Convention. Three projects have absorbed most of the time of the Committee. Committee members volunteered to become regional coordinators of the Rebuild Our Church in Haiti, the 2011 Bishop's Appeal. Most of that work occurred during Lent, but some fundraising is still underway because some congregations needed summer months to schedule their individual appeals.

Secondly, the Committee assembled a stewardship video to be sent to all churches with the letter requesting the Stewardship Shares. The purpose of the video was to show parishioners how their Shares were being used in the Diocese. The three funding priorities emphasized in the video were youth ministries, campus ministries, and the St. Paul's Indian Mission. The Committee hoped that congregations viewing the compelling ministries shown in the video would be more likely to commit their full Stewardship Share to the Diocese.

Lastly, the Committee worked on the construction of the Alleluia Fund to replace the annual Bishop's Appeal. The Alleluia Fund is designed to begin 2012 and run annually for 10 years. The fundraising would proceed from Easter to Pentecost of each year and the money would be used to support youth ministries, new ministry initiatives, and international work. This construction is still in progress, so please check at Convention for more details.

Investment Committee

The Investment Committee is a sub-committee of the Stewardship and Planned Giving Commission. The central duty of the Investment Committee is to review and evaluate the performance of investments of the Diocesan Foundation Fund. Harris Investment Management, Inc. manages most of the Foundation's investments. The Episcopate Fund is invested through A. G. Edwards & Sons. Loring, Wolcott and Coolidge is advisor on "social responsibility" investments. The Committee has a long-term, growth oriented investment outlook and strategy. The primary investment goal is to increase the value of investments to produce larger future income streams.

All congregations of the Diocese are encouraged to contact the Investment Committee regarding investment information and services. An endowment fund is available to receive gifts for the Diocese.

Ways and Means Committee

The Ways and Means Committee is a sub-committee of the Stewardship and Planned Giving Commission and has the following members: Charles Cox, Grant Curtis, Pat Genereux, Kathleen Milligan, James Stanton, John Thompson. Robert Joy and Bill Smith serve as ex-officio members.

The duties of the Committee include preparation and presentation of the annual Diocesan budget, monitoring current year income and expenditures, reviewing congregational pledges, and providing counsel to the Board of Directors on financial matters.

Youth Ministry Development Team

Convener Role is Shared by all Team Members

The Youth Ministry Development Team (YMDT) continues its work living into its mission to resource, serve, support and minister to the children, youth and adult leaders in this diocese. Our ministry is directed by our intentional goals:

- to bring the youth of this diocese together to build community and develop Christian leadership
- to help young people claim their place in the church at all levels
- to equip and train the adults that work with young people in our diocese.

We find our mission to be in keeping with the strategic plan for this diocese.

Members of the YMDT continue to participate in an annual weekend planning session/retreat. We have found this intentional time spent together in prayer, work, and fellowship has deepened our ministry and enhanced our programs.

The following events were held this year:

A team of 8 young people represented the voices of the youth of the diocese at the 158th Diocesan Convention, October 29-30, 2010. The fifth annual Youth Conference took place in conjunction with the convention.

The annual ski trip was held January 21-23, 2011 at Pictured Rocks UMC Camp in Monticello, Iowa. More than 100 youth and adult chaperones attended the weekend, many enjoyed skiing and snowboarding at Sundown Mountain in Dubuque.

The Happening program continues to thrive in the diocese, with 2 Happening events taking place each year. Happening was held March February 25-27 at Trinity, Iowa City and September 2-5 at Jordan Park Camp, West Des Moines. Happening is presented by high school youth for high school youth with the help of lay adult leadership and clergy. This is achieved through youth led group activities, games, skits, singing and worship. During the weekend, participants are invited to consider various aspects of their life, God, their relationship with God in Christ, and their response to God. One of the most distinctive characteristics of the Happening experience is the ongoing community of youth who first attend as candidates and return to serve other youth as part of the Happening team. The leadership development that takes place during Happening weekends encourages youth to claim their place in the church and community at large.

New Beginnings was first introduced to the diocese in 2008. The 6th and 7th New Beginnings took place in 2011 at Pictured Rocks Camp in Monticello on May 13-15 and at St. Luke's, Des Moines on October 7-9. New Beginnings is a junior high retreat designed to respond to the unique issues, concerns, and needs of teenagers. It is run by a team of motivated Christian youth dedicated to serving all on the weekend by living the gospel of Jesus Christ. It is also a chance for youth to reflect on the important relationships in their lives and consider making a "New Beginning."

Twenty-one high school aged teens and six adults attended the Episcopal Youth Event, held June 22-30 at Bethel College in St. Paul, Minnesota. The theme for EYE 2011 was "Come Together: Intimately Linked in this Harvest Work." Iowa youth participated in building a Habitat for Humanity home as well as three days of mission following EYE in local St. Paul human service agencies.

Children and youth of all ages participate in the annual Ministry School and Retreat, which took place this year July 15-17 on the campus of Grinnell College in Grinnell, Iowa. Eight youth ages 3rd-12th grade participated in a choir program. Youth slept at St. Paul's Grinnell, participating in games and learning music which was incorporated throughout the

Ministry School and Retreat. Five children participated in the nursery care program, which is provided free of charge to parents/family attending Ministry School and Retreat.

Summer camp was held July 24-29, 2011 at Pictured Rocks UMC Camp in Monticello, Iowa. Forty-four campers and 20 adults from around the diocese attended the camp, which included swimming, hiking, wall climbing, camping out, a talent show, and much more. Dates for 2012 summer camp are set for July 29-August 3.

Youth Ministry in the Diocese of Iowa relies on many volunteers and donations. Thank you to the adults who spent their weekends on floors and bunk beds chaperoning events. Thank you to all who provided transportation and donated food. And thank you to parents who support their children's participation in diocesan youth events.

Grinnell College

Ministry to Grinnell College students continues as parish based from St. Paul's Church, Grinnell. We utilize interest from the Morgan Bequest to fund one day of my time in parish based student ministry.

Our student programs, Happy Birthdays Unlimited and Survival Kits continue as they have for over 50 years. Students are involved in many aspects of church life including the Vestry, the liturgy, and our education programs. We hope to increase our venues for student involvement this year to include dinners in church members' homes.

Iowa State University

James Tener, ISU Chaplain and St. John's Music Director

Looking back on the 2010-2011 school year at ISU, our program continued at its usual level, with church choir, Sunday lunch fellowship, an occasional Sunday evening meal, and our group attendance at concerts and shows. We initiated a practice of meeting at the church after worship for pizza and board games on an occasional basis. This promoted a nice connection between students as well as saving money. Overall, the strong sense of friendship and fellowship continues to grow.

As chaplain I have been more intentional in my ministry of one on one advising and counseling, trying to help students with difficult situations or spiritual concerns. The more I work with the same students over the years the more I become familiar with their issues and concerns and can be of some assistance in trying to sort out decision making and choice options as well as help them make sense of confusing feelings and beliefs. This is an area that I am well suited for and seem to do well.

The removal of 50% of our resources by the diocese was a difficult burden for us. We were already at "ground zero" when it came to our budget so in order to continue the program as it had been last year I was forced to contribute heavily of my own funds and search out other individuals, without much success, to help support the program of the Student Center. After a very useful discussion with the budget committee in May, I believe the funding may be restored for next year, if all goes as planned. That will be a huge relief, so I hope it happens.

This summer I have been working hard to activate incoming freshmen and have decided on a slightly different approach: instead of assuming that a small Student Center can provide all of the religious opportunities for our students, especially those not singing in the choir, I have begun to ask other members of the staff, volunteer and paid, to help plug these students into church activities that will give them some connection to their church. As a result of more intentionality in this regard, I am seeing some interesting potential results. One of our new students is showing an interest in helping teach Godly Play, two are interested in bell choir, one is interested in leadership in the acolyte program, and one may possibly be interested in child care. I am in the process of calling together a new steering committee with the goal of having serious conversations about the direction of the student center and adding new branches to the existing tree. No one knows for sure where this will lead us. I fully expect to see some new projects of some kind take shape.

One additional element is that Nick Yancey, a four year member of the student center and recent ISU graduate, will be in the area and has agreed to help out in the leadership of the student center. I anticipate his help to add some additional facets to the program while helping him prepare for some area of ministry in his future.

University of Iowa

The Rev. Raisin Horn, Episcopal Chaplain

Trinity Church and Old Brick Episcopal Corporation, Iowa City

"Through campus ministry the church keeps its baptismal promise to support persons in their life in Christ. Many leaders in the church have been involved with campus ministry, and point to these ministries as pivotal moments in their faith development and religious commitment. Campus ministry is an effective investment in the leadership, life and growth of the church and requires the financial and relational commitment of the parish and the diocesan community as a whole in order to be successful, healthy and sustainable." (from Campus Ministry: mentoring a generation, jointly written by the Provincial Coordinators for Campus Ministry, www.episcopalchurch.org/highereducation)

As we consider our diocesan theme of "One Church/Many Locations," Episcopal Campus Ministry at the University of Iowa continued its tradition of worship, service opportunities on campus and beyond, and individual pastoral and vocational counseling to members of the university community. While this program has been based at Trinity Church since 2007, long-standing ministry activities remained in place at Old Brick Church. Maintaining locations both at Trinity and Old Brick again increased the university community's access to ministry programs. Additionally, an Episcopal chaplain involved in regular meetings of the Association of Campus Ministers who gather in different locations in the Iowa City area furthered an Episcopal presence and visibility in multiple places.

The Trinity Church branch of Campus Ministry provided Sunday morning Eucharist and monthly Jazz Evensong followed by student dinners. During the week, students and parishioners gathered for Compline and Chocolate, discussions of student life, and group cooking in the historic church in downtown Iowa City.

Campus Ministry continued at Old Brick with weekly Sunday Taize Evensong and monthly Labyrinth walks on a 40-ft. canvas labyrinth modeled on the pattern used widely in Europe. The reduction in diocesan program monies resulted in

using volunteers for set-ups, printing song sheets, and liturgy preparation, with varying results and a fluctuation in participants.

The Agape Café at Old Brick (in its 18th year) served a hot weekly breakfast in its uniquely attractive setting to low-income neighbors in the surrounding area, soliciting help in serving from the students, faculty, and staff alike from the university community. The yearly "Rise and Shine" breakfast fundraiser in March served over 120 guests and supporters. The Café also benefitted as a recipient of donations from the wedding of one of its volunteers (and Trinity Church vestry member), amounting to gifts allowing the Café to purchase groceries for several months.

Two-thirds of the chaplaincy program budget goes toward Café expenses (to compensate one long-standing Volunteer Coordinator and to purchase food items not provided by donations); the remaining third of program monies are divided among food and groceries for student meals, books for worship and discussion, occasional projects of a student intern (e.g. creating a Facebook group), telephone, advertising, and postage expenses at Old Brick, and yearly insurance costs.

The University of Iowa Jazz Studies Department continues to be housed at Trinity Church while a new School of Music building is under construction. The lively presence of jazz students and faculty has ensured the continuation of collaborative worship experiences at Trinity, as well as opportunities to extend hospitality to members of the campus community by hosting receptions after student recitals. The Trinity sanctuary is a much-sought-after venue for performances, and brings people into the church who otherwise may not venture inside.

Raisin concluded a three-year term as Provincial Coordinator for Campus Ministry in Province VI. This work took her to meetings in New York City each fall to confer with other coordinators at the Episcopal Church Center, under the leadership of the national program director.

She attended the national Episcopal Chaplains' Conference ("Campus Ministry in an Unchurched Era") in June 2011, held in Berkeley, CA, and was honored to serve as Celebrant for the opening Eucharist. At the conference, chaplains and spouses, faculty and students from Church Divinity School of the Pacific as well as Pacific School of Religion gathered for workshops, including a keynote speech on fundraising by presenter Galen Hora.

One challenge of university life is finding a meeting time that fits everyone's schedules. Classes are held most every evening as well as through the noon hour. Students frequently work, and many return home for the weekend. To solve this, campus ministry leaders try a variety of approaches, keep on with what works, and learn from those things that do not work as well.

Upcoming plans for the 2011-2012 year include fundraising, collaboration with the music department, and continuing in a second year with a campus ministry colleague from United and Presbyterian Campus Ministry to share worship, study, and service opportunities. Both groups plan to volunteer at the Ronald McDonald House by preparing meals for families with patients at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics. Episcopal Campus Ministry continues to hold at the center of its work the goal of reaching out to and serving those in need.

Raisin has appointed two returning students as Campus Ministry Interns for the coming academic year: Maggie Younger from Wilmington, Delaware, and Graham Klemme from Iowa City. Peer minister Tom Early at the University of Northern Iowa and Raisin are discussing plans for collaborative ministry activities such as a retreat, with input from Chaplain Maureen Doherty. In such a setting,

the joint campus representatives might discover ways that our Anglican Identity marks us for God's mission in our particular Iowa landscape.

University of Northern Iowa The Rev. Maureen Doherty

2010 and 2011 has been an exciting time for us at UNI. Shortly after we had moved our office to our new location at the Wesley Foundation a major storm swept Cedar Falls and took off the roof of the Campus Ministry leaving us "in an exile location" for close to a year. In April of 2010 we moved back into a GREEN renovated Campus Ministry. The Wesley Foundation where we are housed is beautiful from the front to the back and up and down all three floors.

As the fall began our colleague from the United Methodist Church, Dave Glenn-Burns and Maureen began rotating weekly worship services on Wednesday; this year we have consistently had 25 to 35 students in attendance, this more than doubles the previous years. Our Peer Ministers, Tom Early and Dave Hosack have been active on the Wesley Ministry team and have also reached out using their own gifts and talents. Dave planned a November Ecumenical Service Retreat with the Catholic Student Center, he coordinated a campus wide food drive in December for the Food Bank, he brought together a team and raised over \$600.00 for Relay for Life this spring. Dave was one of ten Episcopal Students invited to come to Washington to participate in a National Ecumenical Advocacy Training toward peace between Israel and Palestine. Dave will leave us in May and attend law school in Iowa City.

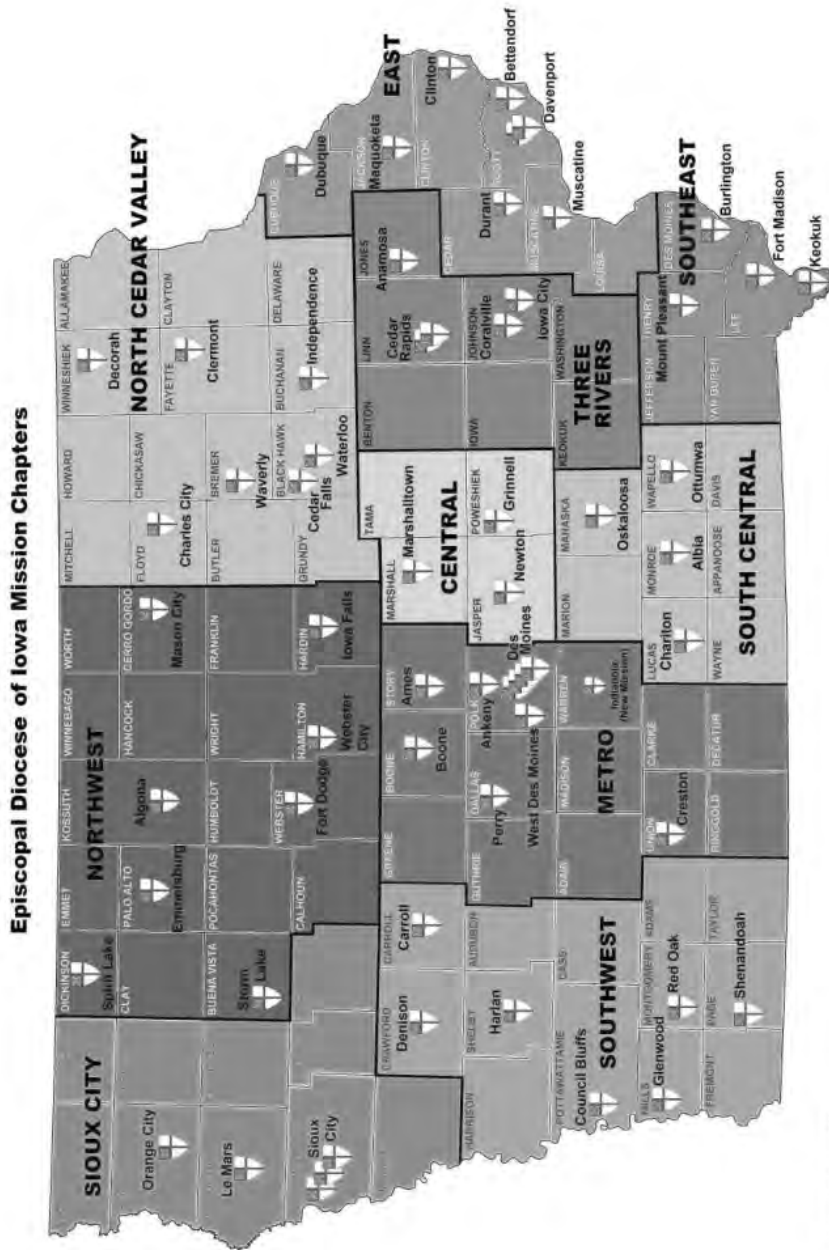
Tom has put considerable energy into a weekly ecumenical Bible Study called "Kaleidoscope." This very diverse group comes together consistently and they have learned to share very different perspectives on Scripture. Tom has been a key participant in monthly religion discussions hosted by the Atheist "Free Thinkers;" often he the only mainline Christian voice. Through his leadership a fall "spiritual retreat" was held at Hartman Reserve. Tom was licensed to preach last summer and has practiced in our weekly worship at Trinity and at St. James. Our Campus Ministry has led the way in gathering volunteers to serve a monthly meal in east Waterloo bringing students not only to serve but to be in conversation with the African American community. This contact has broadened understanding and opened hearts in our ministry.

We are not huge in Episcopal numbers but we are "huge in our presence" on Campus and in our witness to the Gospel that calls us to prayer, study and service. Through our networking with New City Ministries, Maureen's other half life, we are opening doors for more students to come and see and come and serve.

I give thanks to the parishes that have supported us so significantly this year; Trinity, Waterloo and St. Thomas, Sioux City have given internships with youth to Tom. St. Luke's is the home parish for Dave and he is part of choir. St. James and St. Luke's have collected goods for our New City ministries and have provided hands when students are gone.

The ecumenical approach to ministry is critical. Without the support of a place, and staff from the United Methodists we could not make it. Without donations to supplement our monthly Diocese support our ability our outreach would be very limited. We give thanks for the blessings that have come our way.

activity of the diocese featuring a report by our Ecumenical/Interfaith Coordinator, The Rev. Jean McCarthy.

Many Metro youth participated in Diocesan Youth activities, including the 2010 Annual Convention, Happening, New Beginnings, and Summer Camp. Notable progress was made in the food sharing efforts of area faith gardens as well reported in "Iowa Connections." The birth of a new nation in South Sudan was celebrated in several of our parishes and we look forward to our developing relationship with her people.

North Cedar Valley Chapter

Susan Cornforth

The North Cedar Valley Chapter worked this year to build relationships between the member congregations. Two initiatives are under way and will be developed in 2012. The chapter will be engaging in Asset-Based Community Development (ABCD) as a group, hoping to both provide a means to address the needs of the group and model the process for individual congregations within the Chapter. Additionally, the chapter will be piloting a new way of funding Neighborhood Care Points in Swaziland, encouraging individuals, groups and congregations to pledge toward annual operating costs to help meet the gap in funding care for AIDS orphans and other vulnerable children left by reduced contributions from UNICEF. Other ideas the chapter group is considering include "adopting" campus ministry groups and/or programs within the chapter member congregations that serve the poor to make sure that basic funding is available to continue programs. The group is in the brainstorming stage and is looking for ideas on how that would work.

Northwest Chapter

The Rev. Richard Graves

The Northwest Chapter of the Diocese of Iowa is composed of eight congregations: St. Thomas, Algona; Trinity, Emmetsburg; St. Mark's, Fort Dodge; St. Matthew's, Iowa Falls; St. John's, Mason City; St. Alban's, Spirit Lake; All Saints', Storm Lake; and Good Shepherd, Webster City.

Geography continues to be a struggle for our chapter. Our churches are separated by great distances and this makes getting together a real challenge. In the year past, we have had one in-person meeting in the fall of 2010, and we have had one conference call meeting in June of 2011. We have scheduled another in-person meeting in the coming fall, on October 16th, at St. Thomas, Algona.

Over the past year our Chapter has reflected about Episcopal-Anglican Identity and urged support for both the Haiti Appeal and the Swaziland Medical Mission in the fall of 2011. All Saints', Storm Lake has renovated its parking lot and held a book drive to benefit needy children. Members of St. John's, Mason City, participated in RAGBRAI as a team and the congregation continues to explore a connection between ministry and biking. St. Alban's, Spirit Lake, and St. Paul's Indian Mission have forged a relationship with youth and annually engage in mutual mission work. In January, St. Mark's hosted a regional ELCA Lutheran/Episcopal celebration of the ten year anniversary of "A Call to Common Mission," which established full communion between the two traditions.

While there is interest in Chapter-wide event planning, the aforementioned geographic separation us makes this difficult to plan and execute. However, we are open to the movement of the Spirit and a way forward to bring our congregations together for mission may materialize.

Regional Mission Chapters

Sioux City Chapter

The Rev. Pat Roberts

"One Church, Many Locations" This covenant continues to be lived out within the Sioux City Chapter through the five different locations in Sioux City, LeMars and Orange City. We have worked together through the years and continue to recognize the unique gifts each brings to the Church as we are called to live into our Baptismal Covenant, "I will, with God's help."

Calvary has been diligent in Outreach over the past few years offering monetary as well as physical help to such agencies as the Food Bank, the Mission of the Messiah, Interfaith Resources, and an Orphanage in Swaziland. St. Paul's ministers to all peoples by serving a warm meal every Sunday and giving their community clothing provided by the Mission of the Messiah and mittens from the Southwest Chapter. The active youth program reaches out to all Native American families in the surrounding community.

St. George's will be celebrating 130 years of ministry in LeMars next July. The community struggles to stay alive, but continues to live into their worship and ministry to others along with housing a thriving preschool. The Church of the Savior in Orange City is actively growing and reaches out to college students and young families. They have introduced Godly Play in their newly remodeled lower level and offer Morning Prayer midweek. The church is open to the community hosting local groups, meetings, and retreats including Schoolhouse Theatre, a local repertory group. Daily, it is a quiet place for students to study. St. Thomas' thriving Community Garden project now gathers fresh, healthy food for its Food Pantry, which monthly serves 700-900 individuals. A variety of educational programs strive to meet the formational needs of everyone within the parish, and an active choir ministry sharpens up the liturgy. St. Thomas is also in the midst of doing a total assessment of its physical plant through the Recasting Building Assets program sponsored by the diocese and the Episcopal Church Building Fund.

South Central Chapter

No Report

Southeast Chapter

The Rev. John Horn

The Southeast Iowa Chapter consists of four churches: Christ Church, Burlington; St. John's, Keokuk; St. Luke's, Fort Madison; and St. Michael's, Mount Pleasant. The Chapter had two meetings in 2011, on April 3 at St. John's and on August 28 at Christ Church. At the meetings each parish gave an update on what had happened since we last met and outlined plans for the next few months. We also discussed events which we could offer together. The August meeting included viewing the diocesan Stewardship Video and a discussion of the draft 2012 budget led by Grant Curtis of the Ways and Means Committee.

The Chapter offered a Lenten Quiet Day entitled "Living a Holy Lent" on a Saturday in March. Twenty-five people attended from six Episcopal churches, including Iowa City and Warsaw, IL. Clergy from each of the Chapter parishes gave a meditation, followed by a time of reflection. The response from those who attended was very positive. Given the amount of work involved in developing such a retreat, we have discussed bringing someone in for 2012.

In 2012 we will meet on March 11 at St. Michael's Mount Pleasant, and on August 26 at St. Luke's, Fort Madison.

Regional Mission Chapters

Southwest Chapter

The Southwest Chapter held a fall session in September, 2010. Bill Smith, Diocesan Treasurer, presented the Bishop's Letter and the Proposed Budget for 2011. Anne Wagner, Diocesan Staff Liaison, then shared information about the Bishop's Sabbatical and the upcoming Diocesan Convention.

The Southwest Chapter met again in January 2011 at St. John's in Glenwood, sharing food and fellowship. Anne Wagner was unable to attend, so the discussion was led by chairman, Karen McCallan regarding Anglican-Episcopal Identity. Information from a resource "Around One Table" was shared with the group.

A spring meeting was scheduled for April 2011, but was canceled due to numerous scheduling conflicts.

The Southwest Chapter's congregations continue to be actively working toward their Anglican-Episcopal Identity. The Southwest Cluster (Glenwood, Shenandoah and Red Oak) is working on a website that is currently up and running and will be updated as training continues. Some of our congregations (Council Bluffs and Red Oak) are reporting new membership. The MDT in Shenandoah and Red Oak met via Skype (hooray for technology). Two of our congregations (Glenwood and Red Oak) are doing services at local assisted living facilities. Harlan boasts two of their young people that are very active on the Diocesan level. All our congregations are small in number, but continue to do their best at establishing Episcopal identity in Southwest Iowa.

Three Rivers Chapter (formerly South Cedar Valley Chapter)

Formerly known as the South Cedar Valley Chapter, the Three Rivers Chapter met thrice in the past year for business and once for a very good time. Churches in Anamosa, Cedar Rapids, Coralville and Iowa City comprise this Chapter, as well as clergy resident in this region.

The Chapter typically meets before Diocesan Convention to consider resolutions, budget and nominees for Diocesan offices. In a meeting early in 2011 we elected to change our name. Inasmuch as only one of the above municipalities bestrides the Cedar River, and the other communities have shoreline with two other rivers, we decided that the Three Rivers appellation was more descriptive, somewhat Trinitarian, and of our own nomination. We trust that the various Diocesan organizations will adjust their records accordingly.

Relationships with our companion dioceses have always been a large interest in this Chapter. One of our members had journeyed to Scotland in 2010 and met the Dean of the Cathedral in Brechin and his family. Wanting to encourage them to visit Iowa, we held a special Celtic Fest at Trinity, Iowa City to enjoy ourselves together and raise money for their hoped-for travel to Iowa. It was an evening of food, music and storytelling, and gave us opportunity to know one another better. We anticipate their coming in 2012.

Member churches in this Chapter typically contribute a strong roster of lay and clergy for service to the Diocese in many ways. That will certainly continue this next year.

Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 2010 and 2009

1. Nature of Business and Organization

The Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa (the Episcopal Corporation) was incorporated under the laws of the State of Iowa for the purpose of accounting for all funds received through church pledges, gifts, and bequests. Funds are disbursed in the many program areas of the Church upon receiving vouchers from the many individual boards, committees, commissions, or agencies which have been authorized to act on behalf of the Diocese of Iowa. The Diocese also accounts for all property purchased, donated, or sold on behalf of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Iowa.

As part of its operations, the Diocese periodically makes unsecured loans to churches, parishes, and missions which are a part of the Diocese of Iowa. Payments on the loans are to be made from the operating budgets of these organizations in accordance with an agreed upon payment schedule.

The operations of the Episcopal Corporation are carried out primarily by volunteers throughout the Diocese of Iowa as well as the Diocesan office (i.e., the Bishop and his consultants) which is organized to facilitate the overall program development and administration of the Diocese.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Revenue Recognition

Contributions are recognized when a donor makes a promise to give to the Episcopal Corporation that is, in substance, unconditional. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the year the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets, depending on the nature of the restrictions. Permanently restricted net assets represent net assets to be held indefinitely, the income of which is expendable.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, for purposes of reporting on the Statements of Cash Flows, consists of checking and savings accounts used for general operations.

Receivables

The Episcopal Corporation records as receivable only those unpaid amounts, which are considered to be collectible. Therefore, no allowance for doubtful accounts has been provided for in the financial statements. No finance charges are applied to past due accounts. Accounts receivable over ninety days old as of December 31, 2010 and 2009, were \$18,412 and \$14,589, respectively.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Long-Lived Assets

Long-lived assets to be held and used are tested for recoverability whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying amount of the assets may not be recoverable. When required, impairment losses on assets are recognized, based upon the fair value of the asset.

Property, Plant, and Equipment

Property, plant, and equipment are stated at cost of acquisition. Depreciation of plant and equipment is recorded over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets using the straight-line method. Expenditures for major repairs or replacements are capitalized and expenditures for repairs and minor replacements are charged to expense.

Income Taxes

The Diocese is organized exclusively for religious purposes and is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

On January 1, 2009, the Organization adopted FASB ASC 740-10 regarding Uncertain Tax Positions, which requires evaluation of the impact of uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken in a tax return. In some instances, the Organization may be required to recognize a liability related to those tax positions. At December 31, 2010, the Organization had no uncertain tax positions requiring recognition in the financial statements.

Restricted Net Assets

Restricted net assets are classified as permanently and temporarily restricted accounts. Permanently restricted net assets are those whose principal must stay intact. Most of the income generated by the permanently restricted net assets is allowed to be used in current operations. Temporarily restricted net assets are those that have been designated by the donor for a specific program or purpose. Donor restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same fiscal year as received are reported as additions to unrestricted net assets.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications to the 2009 financial statements have been made to conform to the 2010 presentation.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The Organization has adopted the provisions of FASB Accounting Standards Codification 820-10, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, which establishes a framework for measuring fair value and requires enhanced disclosures about assets and liabilities carried at fair value.

As defined in FASB ASC 820-10, fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. FASB ASC 820-10 establishes a fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value into three broad levels as follows:

Level 1 – Quoted prices (unadjusted) are available in active markets for identical assets or liabilities as of the reporting date.

Level 2 – Pricing inputs are quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets or inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly through market corroboration, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument.

Level 3 – Significant inputs to pricing have little or no observability as of the reporting date. The types of assets or liabilities included in Level 3 are those with inputs requiring significant management judgment or estimation, such as complex and subjective models and forecasts used to determine fair value.

As required by FASB ASC 820-10, financial assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Organization's assessment of significance to a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

The following valuation techniques were used by the Corporation in estimating the fair values of financial instruments:

Mutual Funds – The fair values of mutual funds are based on quoted market prices of the shares owned by the Corporation.

Cash and cash equivalents and short-term investments – amounts reported for these instruments are historical cost which approximates their fair value.

Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund – consists of publicly traded debt and equity securities. The Fund is divided into participating units which are valued as of the monthly valuation dates set by the Foundation, which is generally the last day of each month.

Contribution Receivable – Remainder Trust – Trust assets are measured using present value of cash flows discounted at a 6% rate for 30 years.

Beneficial Interest in Perpetual Trusts:

Artemus Bush – Helen Jones Trust – consists of publicly traded debt and equity securities, of which the Corporation has a 20% interest in its investment income. The Corporation's interest in this trust recorded at 20% of its fair market value.

Paul Beer Trust – Trust assets are measured using present value of the annual amount received discounted at a 6% rate for 46 years.

Retiree Health Insurance Payable – liability is measured using present value of the premiums expected to be paid based on retiree life expectancy calculated using the mortality table published by the Office of the Actuary of the Social Security Administration, discounted at 3%. Eligible individuals under age 65 are discounted an additional 10% for each year under 65. During 2010, the Board of Directors elected to terminate the retiree health insurance program effective December 31, 2020.

4. Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Episcopal Corporation to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of demand deposits located at one financial institution. Frequently, the balance of these cash deposits have exceeded the federally insured limit of \$250,000. At December 31, 2010 and 2009, the Company had \$8,916 and \$0, respectively, of cash deposited in excess of the insured limits.

5. Notes Receivable

The Corporation maintains a revolving loan fund which enables churches, missions, etc. to borrow funds to meet various needs. The fund contains approximately 15 loans with balances ranging from \$454 to \$95,733 at December 31, 2010. Interest rates vary from 1.25% to 6.5% per annum with maturities generally being more than 10 years.

6. Conditional Grant

On April 17, 2003, the Corporation entered into an agreement with the Bishop of Iowa granting \$80,000 for the down payment on a home. The grant is amortizable over 25 years, and is factored into the Bishop's annual compensation. In the event that the home is sold or destroyed by fire or other natural disaster, the remaining unamortized balance is due and payable from any applicable proceeds. As of December 31, 2010 and 2009, the unamortized balance of the grant was \$55,645 and \$58,845, respectively.

7. Description of Activities

The unrestricted activities include operations under budget and activities in undesignated and designated reserves.

Operations under budget reflect support of the Episcopate and the programmatic functions of the Diocese and also provides for Diocesan administrative services. The operations are financed primarily by pledges from each mission or parish.

The undesignated and designated reserves consist of separate reserves, which are established for specific purposes and are administered by the Episcopal Corporation Board of Directors and/or the Bishop of the Diocese of Iowa.

Temporarily restricted net assets are comprised of exchange reserves and special purpose funds. The exchange reserves serve as clearing accounts for receipts designated by the source, either inside or outside of the Diocesan structure, for transmittal outside the Diocese. Special purpose funds were established to account for contributions restricted by an outside source for special purpose expenditures and are administered by the Bishop and/or the Board of Directors.

Permanently restricted net assets are contributions received by the Diocese, which are to generate income to be transferred to other funds. These funds are administered by the Diocese in accordance with the terms specified by the donor at the time of the gift or bequest.

All land and buildings owned by the Diocese of Iowa are recorded as real estate at their historical cost or fair market value, in the case of gifts.

Proceeds from the sale of land and buildings may either be retained by the Diocese or passed through to the church. The use of the sales proceeds is determined by the Board on a case-by-case basis.

8. Investments

Investments in CDs, money funds, and securities are stated at fair market value and are summarized as follows as of December 31:

Related Party Investment

The Board of Directors of the Episcopal Corporation acts as trustee of the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund, a common investment fund available to parishes, missions, and other organizations of the Diocese of Iowa. The Foundation Fund invests primarily in marketable equity and debt securities. Diocesan investments in the Foundation are carried at their fair market value. The Episcopal Corporation owned 87,216 and 90,843 participating units in the Fund at December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively. The Corporation's total equity in the Fund at December 31, 2010 and 2009, was \$4,749,633 and \$4,592,423, respectively (\$2,710,048 and \$2,844,914 at cost). As of December 31, 2010, the Foundation owed the Corporation \$37,817 (\$42,551 in 2009).

Realized gains and losses are determined on the basis of the average cost method. Sales proceeds and gross realized gains and losses on marketable equity and debt securities were as follows for the years ended December 31:

9. Retirement Compensation Plans

In order to provide retirement benefits to the full-time employees of the Diocesan office, the Episcopal Corporation participates in a multi-employer pension plan. The plan provides benefits to substantially all employees in the Corporation. The pension expense for the year ended December 31, 2010 was \$73,137 (\$69,992 in 2009).

10. Medical and Life Insurance for Retired Clergy

It is the policy of the Convention of the Diocese of Iowa to maintain medical and life insurance coverage up to certain limits for the lifetime of all retired and disabled Diocesan clergy who meet certain required criteria. Medical and life insurance premiums paid for retired clergy for the year ended December 31, 2010, was \$49,464 (\$39,517 in 2009).

11. Operating Lease

The Corporation leases office equipment from Bankers Leasing Company and Pitney Bowes. The Bankers Leasing Company lease requires monthly payments of \$328, and the Pitney Bowes lease requires quarterly payments of \$576. Both leases are cancelable with 90 days notice. Rent expense for the years ending December 31, 2010 and 2009, totaled \$6,237 and \$6,277, respectively.

12. Depreciation Expense

Depreciation expense was \$11,505 and \$10,838 in 2010 and 2009, respectively.

13. Remainder and Perpetual Trusts

The Corporation is beneficiary of three trusts. Each trust is valued at the Corporation's share of the underlying investments. All trusts consist of marketable securities and are permanently restricted net assets. At December 31, 2010, the remainder trust valued at \$8,034 was discounted at 6% over 30 years, the life expectancy of the primary beneficiaries.

14. Endowment Funds

The Foundation's endowment funds consist of unrestricted net assets, board-designated (discretionary) unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets which are available for projects and permanently restricted net assets which provide that the principal be invested in perpetuity and the income only be used. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Board of Directors of the Corporation has not as yet fully reviewed and interpreted the provisions of Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act, which was adopted as law in the State of Iowa during 2008. At the present time, the Corporation has adopted the practice of preserving the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the permanently restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result, the Corporation classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, and (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment. Use of the investment income from the assets may be unrestricted and used as the Corporation deems necessary for the purposes for which the original restricted gift was received. Currently, the Corporation considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- The duration and preservation of the fund
- The purposes of the Corporation and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- General economic conditions
- The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- Other resources of the Corporation
- The investment policies of the Corporation

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with donor-restricted funds may fall below the level that the donor requires the Corporation to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, deficiencies of this nature that are reported in unrestricted net assets were \$0 and \$0 at December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 2010 and 2009

1. Nature of Organization

The Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund is a common investment fund available to all parishes, missions, and other organizations of the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa. Harris Trust and Savings Bank of Chicago, Illinois, holds the Foundation Fund's investment assets in trust and executes transactions therein at the direction of the Board of Directors of the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa. Trustee fees are based on the market value of all investments in the trust at the end of each quarter.

The Fund is divided into participating units which are valued as of the monthly valuation dates set by the Foundation, which is generally the last day of each month. Units may be issued or withdrawn on the first day of each month. Monthly distributions of 5% (6% in 2009), based on a rolling three year average of the portfolio balance, less operating and management expenses, are made to participating organizations. The accounting records of the Fund are maintained on the accrual basis.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Cash

For the purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents are comprised of cash on hand, savings, and checking accounts.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Financial Instruments

The carrying amounts of cash, receivables, accounts payable, and other liabilities approximate their fair value due to the short-term maturities of these financial instruments.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The Foundation has adopted the provisions of FASB Accounting Standards Codification 820-10, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, which establishes a framework for measuring fair value and requires enhanced disclosures about assets and liabilities carried at fair value.

As defined in FASB ASC 820-10, fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. FASB ASC 820-10 establishes a fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value into three broad levels as follows:

Level 1 – Quoted prices (unadjusted) are available in active markets for identical assets or liabilities as of the reporting date.

Level 2 – Pricing inputs are quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets or inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly through market corroboration, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument.

Level 3 – Significant inputs to pricing have little or no observability as of the reporting date. The types of assets or liabilities included in Level 3 are those with inputs requiring significant management judgment or estimation, such as complex and subjective models and forecasts used to determine fair value.

As required by FASB ASC 820-10, financial assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Foundation's assessment of significance to a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

The following methods and assumptions were used by the Foundation in estimating the fair value of its financial instruments.

Investments in marketable securities, including mutual funds, and cash equivalents are measured at fair value based on quoted prices in active markets and as such are categorized as Level 1.

The carrying amounts of cash, receivables, accounts payable, accrued expenses, and other liabilities approximate their fair values due to the short-term maturities of these financial instruments.

3. Fair Value Measurements

5. Related Party Transactions

The Convention of the Diocese of Iowa elects and provides guidance to the Board of Directors of the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa, which in turn, functions as the trustee to the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund.

The Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa (the Corporation) owned 87,216 and 90,843 participating units in the Fund at December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively. The Corporation's total equity in the Fund at December 31, 2010 and 2009 was \$4,749,633 and \$4,592,423, respectively.

At December 31, 2010, the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund owed the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa \$33,404 (\$34,538 in 2009).

6. Income Taxes

The Foundation is organized exclusively for religious purposes and is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

On January 1, 2009, the Foundation adopted FASB ASC 740-10 regarding Uncertain Tax Positions, which requires evaluation of the impact of uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken in a tax return. In some instances, the Foundation may be required to recognize a liability related to those tax positions. At December 31, 2010, the Foundation had no uncertain tax positions requiring recognition in the financial statements.

7. Subsequent Events

The Organization has evaluated events and transactions occurring after December 31, 2010 for potential items required to be recognized or disclosed in the financial statements. Subsequent events were evaluated through May 31, 2011, the date the financial statements were issued.

Bishop's Appointments/Advisory Groups

Chaplains to the Retired Clergy, Spouses and Surviving Spouses

The Rt. Rev. Alan Scarfe, Bishop

The establishment of the Chaplains to the Retired network came out of the Church Pension Group and was recognized by General Convention (2006). Over the last year the diocese has had the services of four clergy who have been active as appointed chaplains to the retired clergy of the Diocese: Liane Nichols, Bill Moorhead, Jean McKinney, Glenn Rankin. In this ministry, chaplains function partly on their own initiative following up on retired clergy but also as directed in my own pastoral references.

The Diocese of Iowa has also been represented by Chaplain Jean McKinney, accompanied by John McKinney, at conferences to which our Chaplains have been invited for the purpose of education, sharing with each other and meeting with officers of the Pension Fund. The first regional meeting was held at Camp Allen in Texas in October of 2009; followed by the National Conference in Phoenix, AZ in April of 2010. On October 18, 2011, another regional meeting will be held, again at Camp Allen, TX. It has been helpful seeing how other dioceses are doing this ministry, sharing what we are doing in Iowa, and learning new ways of reaching out. We thank the McKinnays for their participation and representation on this level. We are very well served by all those who have been appointed and are grateful for the service of all of our chaplains.

Commission on

Church Property, Architecture & Allied Arts Ray Gaebler, Representative of the Board of Directors

A major responsibility of this commission is to review and recommend Revolving Fund Loan applications. This fund was established in the 1960s and guidelines were last revised in 1993. Since that time economic conditions have changed dramatically and it was becoming increasingly difficult to work under the 1993 guidelines. In 2010 a task group was established and September 9, 2011 the Board of Directors approved new guidelines. New applications are being prepared and will be available by year end 2011.

Commission On Clergy Wellness

The issue that has dominated Clergy Wellness the past few years has been, and will continue to be, health care. The advent of the Denomination Health Plan (DHP) ushers in an era of a Church-wide plan that will bring many positive changes. It will also be a challenge as the plan incorporates coverage for lay employees as well as stipended clergy. The DHP is slated to take effect in January 2013.

Anne Wagner and Daniel Montgomery have been the leaders in learning about the DHP and are working with the Board of Directors and vestries in implementing the plan for the Diocese of Iowa. It is vitally important that clergy and parish lay leadership learn all they can in order to effect a smooth transition.

This will also be my last report as the facilitator of this important commission as I have also resigned from this group, since I have been serving as its facilitator since 2003. New leadership will hopefully be able to move forward on a number of issues that have not been dealt with the past couple of years.

Bishop's Appointments/Advisory Groups

I am most appreciative of the Bishop's support, the staff, especially Anne Wagner who has been key in keeping abreast of the progress of the DHP, and the members of the Commission.

Benefits Task Group Ms. Anne Wagner

The main focus of the Benefits Task Group for the past year has been to understand, research, and plan for the implementation of the Denominational Health Plan (DHP).

The DHP is a Church-wide program of healthcare benefit plans authorized by General Convention and administered by the Church Pension Fund, with benefits provided through the Medical Trust. The implementation date for the DHP is January 1, 2013. Information about the DHP through The Church Pension Fund is available online at: www.cpg.org/administrators/insurance/health-and-wellness/denominational-health-plan/.

There are 3 decisions that the Diocese of Iowa must make regarding implementation: 1) Whether schools and other Episcopal institutions must participate, 2) Cost-share, and 3) selection of the plans available through the Medical Trust that will be offered in Iowa.

In early 2011 we conducted a survey to help understand the potential impacts on congregations in Iowa. Based on the survey, there are 11 congregations that may be impacted because they currently offer insurance coverage through a different provider than the Medical Trust, they have full-time lay employees, and/or they have a preschool.

In May 2011 we held 2 meetings for clergy and lay employees and their church employers to share information about the DHP. 2 representatives from the Medical Trust, Garth Howe and Stan Zulewski were also present at these meetings.

Upon the recommendation of the Benefits Task Group, on September 9, 2011 the Board of Directors approved the offering of 3 plan choices in Iowa effective January 1, 2012. Open enrollment will take place in late October through early November this year.

Throughout the fall of 2011, the Benefits Task Group will make presentations and listen to the questions and comments of vestries and finance committees. Please contact the diocesan office if you are interested.

At convention this year, we will have Medical Trust representative, Toni Marie Sutliff present. She will be presenting a pre-convention workshop and will be available for questions throughout convention.

In late 2011 and early 2012, the Benefits Task Group will be providing options and recommendations to the Board of Directors around cost-share and the participation of schools and institutions.

Fresh Start in Iowa Ms. Julianne Allaway, Diocesan Coordinator

Fresh Start gatherings continue in Iowa on a near quarterly basis (March, May, October, November in 2011) offering continuing education and support for those in transition in their ministry. Generally participants are recently ordained and/or entering a new position or cure, with a variety of ministry experience and ample wisdom to share within this unique colleague group.

Exploration continues around how best to incorporate Ministry Development Team members along with other bi-vocational clergy in Iowa for continuing formation and education in and through Fresh Start.

We're pleased to announce that Elizabeth Popplewell, also as a Ministry Development Team coach, joins the Iowa Fresh Start team in October 2011, having completed national facilitator training.

Our thanks extend to St. Timothy's Church, West Des Moines, and to St. Luke's Church, Des Moines, who have offered meeting space for Fresh Start this past year. We are grateful for the gift of their hospitality.

We gather at Pictured Rocks United Methodist Camp in Monticello for a Fall 2011 Friday-Saturday Retreat sponsored by the Fresh Start community and expanded to welcome all Episcopal Clergy in Iowa. The Retreat, an opportunity for refreshment and continuing education, features a session with Ben Webb: "Clergy Renewal: Living and Leading like a Fountain". Ben, an Episcopal Priest, also serves as Director of the Center for Regenerative Society, which provides leadership renewal programs for people and institutions working for a more healthy, just and sustainable world in our region. About Fresh Start ~ primarily intended to support clergy and congregations in navigating the critical period of transition in clergy leadership. A diocesan-led program for clergy in new positions and the congregations they serve, the national-level Fresh Start program is designed to be adapted to the needs of each diocese. Fresh Start's content is based on three key principles: the theory of transition; the importance of relationship-building; and the need for self-care. Modules are clustered around these principles and the general area of leadership.

Commission On Ministry The Rev. Mary Jane Oakland, Chair

The Commission on Ministry (COM) met 6 times since the last diocesan convention. We are thankful for the dedicated members of this Commission for their time and efforts in interviewing those who come to the Bishop and Commission in discerning calls to ordained ministry as priests and deacons, as well as, Ministry Development Teams (MDT) preparing to be ordained/commissioned. We give thanks for those responding to God's call to ministry in this diocese whether ordained, commissioned, or lay ministry.

Continuing Education guidelines outlining expectations for deacons, priests, and members of Ministry Development Teams were distributed at the time of our last diocesan convention. In the first week of Lent, 2012, all priests, deacons and MDT members will submit to the Bishop documentation of their continuing education activities with a description of how this education is being used in their ministry, and to discuss their self-assessed needs and goals for continuing education during 2012.

During the year the Commission members read and discussed, The Next Christians, by Gabe Lyons. We also read Mission Shaped Church, on the work in the Church of England with their efforts to establish Fresh Expression of Church, as background for a June COM workshop that was canceled.

In June, Mary Jane Oakland and Ellen Bruckner attended a 3-day conference, "Local Formation and the Missional Church", held in Kansas City and hosted by the Diocese of Kansas for the provinces in the middle section of the country. Information from this conference will be used in planning COM activities for the next year.

A special debt of gratitude is owed to the Rev. Margaret Weiner who provides, through her volunteer service, administrative coordination for the work of COM and the diocesan record keeping for all those who come to COM. This is a large and very important task of caring stewardship for the work of this commission.

Lifelong Christian Formation Oversight Committee

The Rev. Torey Lightcap, Convener

Whatever else Christian formation is in the Diocese of Iowa, it should be unceasing, accessible, relevant, timely, and sustainable.

Owing to the work of PEALL (Proclaiming Education for All), and by mandate (Resolution A083) of the 76th General Convention, diocesan Substitute Resolution 157 E-D was passed in 2010 and calls for the establishment of a Lifelong Christian Formation Oversight Committee for Iowa. Also mandated by the same resolution was the formulation of a strategy for lifelong learning in the Diocese of Iowa.

The Committee has spent the bulk of its inaugural year in consideration of just who and what it is, and by extension what it is to do. It seems safe to say that at this point the Committee sees itself and its task as primarily collective in nature rather than directive. That is, we recognize that much good work is already being done in Episcopal congregations across Iowa, and that it seems much more sensible to harness this work -- to name and affirm it, and allow it to be replicated or built upon, hopefully getting better with each use -- rather than impose the opinions of experts over the top of them. The thought is to create mechanisms and spaces to pose questions to congregations like "What are you reading/teaching/pondering that's working for you?" or, alternately, "What are you longing for to aid you in your Christian journey?"

As a diocese, we often think and pray together in common cycles and seasons, with common concerns, questions, and joys. Consequently, we can see how natural it might seem to group those common concerns under a general heading: "Has anyone read a great Lenten type book about forgiveness?" "Are there movies that deal with sin in constructive ways?" "Does anyone have a syllabus for a course on the mystics?" "How can I see political elections through the lens of my faith?" One advantage of this kind of approach is that it allows for the creation of more "packaged" resources when it seems appropriate for them to be offered. Perhaps there's a need for a parcel of resources on a given topic (e.g., Anglicanism, prayer, diakonia), perhaps each part having a different message, in different media types, and addressing the various dispositions for how people tend to learn. The Committee sees this kind of work as within its purview - but again, as a response to a need.

Our aim, at least for now, is to use existing (cheap or in many cases free) technology to begin these conversations. The intention is to go where the people already are and listen well.

In concert with this effort, the Committee has adopted some standards for what lifelong Christian formation can be in the diocese, and we are looking into adapting others to suit need. One specific item of interest is the Charter for Lifelong Christian Formation (<http://www.formationcharter.com/Services.html>), whose fundamental statement is that "Lifelong Christian Faith Formation in The Episcopal Church is lifelong growth in the knowledge, service and love of God as followers of Christ and is informed by Scripture, Tradition and Reason."

Nzara Exploratory Committee

Tim Bascom, Chair

The 2010 Convention of the Iowa Episcopal Diocese called for a discernment committee to explore a possible companion relationship with the Diocese of Nzara in the newly formed Republic of South Sudan. A group of seven members (Tim Bascom, Kathleen Milligan, Peggy Harris, Melody Rockwell, Jonathan Hansen, Margaret Hansen, Julianne Allaway) was formed to begin a year-long process, starting with a first meeting, May 9, 2011. Since May, we have met three times and established communication with a sister committee in the Nzara Diocese to discuss the mutual benefits and difficulties of a companion diocese relationship.

Today, the Diocese of Iowa seems to be well-known in Nzara due to their bishop, Samuel Peni, who spent two years studying in Dubuque, regularly visiting churches such as the Cathedral in Davenport, St. Timothy's in Des Moines, St. Andrews Des Moines, and St. Luke's Des Moines. The Rev. Bob North, who works in Nzara, has added to the high profile of Iowa after visiting our 2010 Convention and reporting back. In addition, a recent Iowa campaign provided bicycles to Nzara clergy, making people there more aware of our diocese while adding to our awareness, too.

As a committee, we see that certain protocol issues are being raised by specific fundraising requests sent directly from Nzara to individual Iowa Episcopal churches, indicating apparent confusion about the difference between a companion-diocese relationship and parish-to-parish relationships. Certainly, the local support given by Iowa parishes has contributed to an overall sense of connection, but more clarity could be developed about the larger possibilities and procedures of a full companion-diocese relationship.

As part of the ongoing discernment process, our Iowa committee is taking into account existing companion relationships with the Dioceses of Brechin and Swaziland, and we would recommend the drafting of a more formal covenant between all Iowa-companion dioceses. In addition, we have gathered information about the rapidly-evolving Episcopal Church in South Sudan, about existing links between South Sudan and other Episcopal dioceses, and about the general history of the Nzara area. We have also hosted representatives from the Eastern Diocese of Missouri, who offered useful advice from an existing companion relationship with the Diocese of Lui in South Sudan.

We, as a Committee, are glad to see that the security situation in Nzara seems to be improving, unlike the volatile northern regions of the new Republic of South Sudan near the Nuba Mountains and Abyei. Although there are occasional disruptions in Nzara from the Ugandan-based Lord's Resistance Army, that guerrilla army has been reduced in numbers and impact. One of the particular challenges of interacting between the two dioceses is the very limited infrastructure for postal, phone and email communication. However, we hope to increase face-to-face contact through Skype, a personal visit of committee members to Nzara, and perhaps a visit of Nzara committee members to Iowa.

Professional Development Leave Committee

The Rt. Rev. Alan Scarfe

Professional Development Leaves are for the purpose of encouraging professional growth and an increased competence of the clergy and lay professionals, which will contribute to the life and work of the Church in the Diocese of Iowa. Leaves may be granted for regular study at any academic level in a college, university or seminary, for research in a specific area of the Church's life, or for other creative work, which will benefit the Church in the Diocese of Iowa.

Such leaves are administered by a Committee appointed annually by the Bishop/Ecclesiastical Authority in consultation with the Diocesan Council. This group of five members (three lay, two clergy) has continued faithfully this year to advise the Bishop. In the year 2010, Sharon Mahood, submitted and received approval from the Professional Development Leave Committee and the Bishop for individual continuing education.

Strategic Planning Task Group

The Rev. Richard Graves, Convener

The Strategic Planning Task Group (SPTG) held its first meeting at Mills House in Des Moines on March 19, 2011. All members of the SPTG were present: John Gardner, Richard Graves, John Horn, Phyllis Melton, Ryan Pendell, Catherine Quehl-Engel, Kate Rose, John Thorpe, and Julianne Allaway.

Regular meetings, both in person and electronic, have been held since and a progress report was given to the Board of Director's in July before the Summer Ministry Retreat in Grinnell. Additionally, an SPTG scope of work has been proposed and accepted. It includes research and data, future issues and trends, a congregational survey instrument, and a program to assist congregations to engage in meaningful dialogue about their assets following the principles of a model for community change known as Asset Based Community Development.

The SPTG is scheduled to present a five to seven year strategic plan for adoption at the 2012 Diocesan Convention.

Diocesan Officers

Chancellor

Mr. Thomas W. Carpenter, Chancellor

The Chancellor and the Vice Chancellor (Linda Neuman) have consulted with the Bishop, his staff and other individuals on matters of legal significance, as appropriate, and have assisted with legal matters, as necessary.

Historiographer

Dr. Thomas B. Colbert

As historiographer, I have fielded only one question this past year. Archival material by necessity remains with operating parishes—Vestry minutes, other church records, and local press clippings. The more that can be done to coordinate such materials held anywhere in the diocese would be helpful. Parishes should continue to submit copies of printed material about their special activities and any other historically relevant information adding to the “story” of the parish to the diocesan archives. The diocesan archives should hold as many documents as available that pertain to the history of the diocese. More communication between the diocesan offices (keepers of the archives) and parishes may enhance the answering of the few but often esoteric questions presented to the archives.

Finally, I must note that the need to improve the condition of the archives collection—preservation through cataloging/organizing hinges on funding—a condition that has been the subject of conversation off and on throughout my tenure at Historiographer. With the economy struggling at the moment, to consider any funding to that end would not be a good use of limited resources. However, in the future, if the diocese wishes to improve the condition and workings of the archives, the contracting of a professional archivist to evaluate and structure the collection would be recommended.

Altar Guild

The Diocesan Altar Guild newsletter, "A Light in the Sacristy," continues to be issued quarterly. A printed copy is mailed to all Altar Guild Directors and churches throughout the Diocese. The newsletter is also available on the Diocesan website. Reports, suggestions, and news items are welcomed from altar guilds and their directors.

The Altar Guild ordered and prepared the chrism oils that were distributed to the clergy following Chrism Mass during Holy Week.

The Loan Closet has become a Room! The Diocesan Altar Guild Loan Closet has moved from a small closet in the lower hallway at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Des Moines, to a spacious, well lighted room in their undercroft. We are grateful to Dean Cathleen Bascom and the cathedral staff for such a generous favor and thankful for the luxurious space. The many gifts of frontals, chasubles and stoles, glass cruets, candlesticks and chalices are well displayed in the new Loan Closet.

The Diocesan Altar Guild would be pleased to be of help to altar guilds and their directors throughout the state and would be willing to visit if there is a need.

Congregational Companions

Ellen Bruckner

After a year of forming, the Companions have more clearly identified their role in the Diocese. We are compiling resources for congregations and are available to help facilitate a variety of resources with congregations. We have put together an informal look at congregations who are seeking some directional work. We are available for Vestry/Bishop's Committee retreats. We are working with congregations who are taking a detailed look at their facilities and determining how these facilities might be used to benefit the church community as well as the larger community. Four congregations are working with The Episcopal Church Building Fund on a program entitled, "Recasting Our Assets". Next spring several congregations will engage with The Episcopal Church's Office of Congregational Vitality and begin work with "Missio:engage" – a program designed to lead congregations into becoming more aware and active in attracting, welcoming and incorporating new members. There are times when a congregation might want to do a bit of strategic planning or changing of focus and Congregational Companions are available to help with this.

The Companions work in pairs, usually one clergy person and one lay person. They are willing to develop congregational development programs to fit the local congregation. We will keep expanding our resources and are always willing to take a look at what is going well in places and add these strategies to our resource portfolio.

Office of Disaster Relief & Recovery

The past 12 months were a time of several severe national disasters around the world, in North America and the State of Iowa. Tornados, flooding, hurricanes, wild fires, earthquakes and tsunamis have dominated the news around the world. These events bring to mind those biblical passages and warnings that remind us the end may be near. We know however that is not how it works.

Diocesan Coordinators/Resources

Each devastating event does bring an end to a way of life for those who suffer through the disaster. Indeed, many lose their lives. Yet out of the pain and suffering of loss emerges help from persons known and unknown. Recovery comes for most in one form or another, others suffer the affects for the rest of their lives. Disaster relief is not just a program for fixing what has been broken or replacing that which has been lost, but rather it is a concerted effort by individuals, communities, organizations and governments coming together to rebuild lives in the best way possible.

During this past year the Episcopal Church through the leadership of persons like Katie Mears and Alison Hare working through Episcopal Relief and Development have began the task of recruiting and training Diocesan Disaster Coordinators (DDC's). The DDCs work with bishop's and other Diocesan leadership to support and coordinate disaster relief, whether local or elsewhere. Training for Midwest DDCs was held in Chicago in March and more are planned for the future around the country.

In addition, Episcopal Relief and Development is working with Johns Hopkins to develop leadership and support models to assist in disaster recovery. A workshop for clergy and lay leaders was held in late May in Cedar Rapids to train leaders to support both victims and disaster responders.

In August I tended my resignation to Bishop Scarfe as the Diocese of Iowa's Diocesan Disaster Coordinator. After three years I felt that it was time for me to pursue other interests and to allow for new leadership. I thank Bishop Scarfe, the Diocesan staff, the Board of Directors and all the clergy and lay leaders who supported me, and indeed jumped in and were "boots on the ground" when it has come to seeking ways to assist disaster victims.

Diocesan Ecumenical & Interreligious Officer The Rev. Jean McCarthy

I continue to serve as the Province VI Coordinator on the Executive Committee of EDEIO (Episcopal Diocesan and Interreligious Officers). At the Executive Committee Meeting this past February, we began to struggle with the changes in the national church with reorganization and reduction of staff. The question before us was how EDEIO supports the Standing Committee on Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations (SCEIR). We began by prioritizing our needs and responsibilities, and planning where to concentrate our efforts. Reception at the grassroots of our ecumenical work was our first priority this year. As a result, we planned joint gatherings at the National Workshop on Christian Unity (NWCUC) in April, to dialogue on this topic.

The NWCUC was held May 9-12, 2011, in Pittsburgh, PA. The first order of business was to deal with the resignation of The Rev Dr Tom Ferguson from the national office. We explored ways to find lines of communication with the SCEIR. A joint plenary was held with the Lutherans (ELCA) and the United Methodists to tell our stories about what is happening at the grassroots level. We were able to share in this way what works and what needs to be changed in our ecumenical relationships. We saw this as a time to build bridges and share resources. We shared what we saw as possibilities, and affirmed that hope resides in change. Reception of our work together ecumenically is much more than prayer; it is growing together into the future. The 1982 Lima Document, a Faith and Order Paper from the World Council of Churches, Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry, was part of a dialogue about Ministry and how our dialogues are shaped.

We are in our eleventh year of full communion with the ELCA, and this past year completed full communion with both the Northern and Southern Provinces of the Moravian Church. Dialogue continues with the United Methodists to work toward full communion. Bilateral dialogues are continuing with the Presbyterians. Biggest challenge is reception and opening lines of communication on all levels.

I continue working with JustFaith Ministries and have accepted a position on their Board of Directors. Peace and justice work is where ecumenism and reception are seen as we join with others (Christian and Interfaith) to further God's work in this world. Much happens on the local level in these areas. On the Board of Directors I have opportunity to help an organization that began in the Roman Catholic Church to expand into the wider Christian community.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, now over 100 years old, is the week between the Confession of Peter on January 19 and the Conversion of Paul on January 25. There are a wide variety of resources available on the web at www.geii.org.

Information and documents are available on the National Church web site (www.episcopalchurch.org) under Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations (EIR). In the tensions of today's world, the work on interreligious dialogue continues to be very important.

Global Missioner

The Rev. Melody Rockwell

In Iowa, Global Mission works as an active part of the diocesan One World One Church Commission (OWOC) to encourage, inform and celebrate members of our diocese engaged in mission.

Global Mission supported, publicized and prayed for an education mission to Guatemala (November 2010), and health care missions to the Dominican Republic (January-February 2011) and to Swaziland (September-October 2011).

Global Mission/Iowa strives to strengthen mutual relationships within the 23-year old, three-way companionship among the Diocese of Swaziland, Southern Africa, the Diocese of Brechin, Scotland, and the Diocese of Iowa, and honor the growing bonds of affection with the new Diocese of Nzara, Sudan.

Through the generosity of Diocese of Iowa parishes, 14 Neighborhood Care Points (NCPs) are able to provide care for nearly 1,000 orphans and other vulnerable children in Swaziland. An anonymous donation made possible the construction of a new feeding station north of Mbabane, Swaziland, to serve impoverished children and elders there. Funds and testing kits have been provided for the Safe Water Ministry Team in Swaziland to continue their work distributing and monitoring chlorinators, and to support needed water quality projects, such as secure water storage tanks, roof rainwater collection systems and sanitary latrines. In this time of a devastated economy in Swaziland, these partnering efforts are particularly appreciated.

On June 10, the Rev. Dr. Barbara Schlachter, newly-appointed diocesan coordinator of Brechin Companions, led a Three Rivers Chapter Celtic Fest, a merry dancing, eating and fundraising gathering at Trinity, Iowa City. This event served as an inauguration of a hoped-for rekindling of Brechin-Iowa exchanges and relation building among individuals and parishes throughout both dioceses.

We mourned the death of Diocese of Brechin Bishop John Mantle (November 2011), rejoiced as Christ Church, a new church/school/community center was dedicated in Mpaka, Swaziland on April 9, 2011, lauded the one-year mission enterprise to Sudan (beginning in May 2011) of recent high school graduate George Cole-Duvall, as well as the continuing

and multiple constructive projects by the Rev. and Mrs. Robert North with Bishop Samuel Pene in the Diocese of Nzara, Sudan, and looked forward to renewed Brechin-Iowa relationships with the installation of the new Bishop of Brechin, Nigel Peyton, on October 8, 2011.

We give thanks for the guidance and solid support offered by Bishop Alan Scarfe for companion relationships and global mission projects. We also appreciate David Oakland, Convener, One World One Church Commission, for his able facilitation of these global mission ministries, and Dr. T.R. Shively for his dedicated service on the Global Episcopal Mission Network Board of Directors.

Jubilee Ministry

Leslee Sandberg, Diocesan Jubilee Officer (DJO)

Iowa Episcopal churches that are Jubilee Ministry centers accept the Jubilee Ministry Mandate to be a "ministry of joint discipleship in Christ with poor and oppressed people, wherever they are found, to meet basic human needs and to build a just society." We currently have 9 centers from all parts of the diocese and with varied ministries. We are planning to add a tenth Jubilee Center at the time of the 2011 diocesan convention.

Jubilee Ministry is faith in action -- loving God with all our heart, mind, soul and strength by loving our neighbors as ourselves. Jubilee Ministry connects these two important dynamics of the spiritual journey, enabling God's reconciling work to be seen through us. One of the functions of Jubilee Ministry is to challenge and confront Episcopalians and others to understand the facts of poverty and injustice, encouraging them to take an active role in meeting the needs of the poor and in the struggles against the causes of such suffering. It is both charity and advocacy.

Jubilee Centers network with each other across the Episcopal Church to share their ministries and to learn from each other. Centers are also eligible for a variety of grant opportunities from the Episcopal Church and most of the Iowa Centers have received grants in amounts ranging from a few hundred dollars to fifteen thousand dollars.

Although there are ten recognized Jubilee Centers in Iowa, there are many more Episcopal Churches with a focus on the needs of the poor. We need those churches to join the Jubilee network. Ministry Development Teams

The Diocese continues to nurture six active Ministry Development Teams. Three of the teams are ordained and commissioned and are fully functioning with their congregations. There is a second team in process in Ft. Madison and a team in process in Red Oak/Shenandoah. Teams are continuing to develop their ministry and the ministry of people in their congregations. Our challenge for some of the teams is the changing paradigm for congregations. Everyone in the congregation has to recognize their call to ministry. The Church is there to support and encourage each person's growth in God. It is life-giving to watch this happen, but this change is often a difficult one and one that takes some time. It is too easy to fall back into established patterns of life before the Ministry Development Team.

The Teams are coming together annually in retreat to focus on their work and to share their stories. The Teams also meet quarterly via web conference to check in with each other and to continue the sharing.

Safeguarding God's Children

The Diocese of Iowa continues to offer Safeguarding God's Children training to congregations in an effort to prevent the sexual abuse of children generally and in ministries and church activities for children and youth. Safeguarding God's Children is provided through Church Pension Group. In November 2007, the Diocese of Iowa began using Safeguarding Online. Safeguarding Online, like Safeguarding God's Children, is developed by Praesidium and provided by the Church Pension Group. Safeguarding Online covers the same content as Safeguarding God's Children. A new feature of the online program is the availability of training modules specifically for day camp, summer camp, and church pre-schools.

Both Safeguarding God's Children and Safeguarding Online are and will remain available for congregations in the Diocese of Iowa. Both versions of the training fulfill the diocesan mandate for training. However, some congregations prefer the in-person training for the primary training and the online training as a refresher course. Our goal is 100% compliance with diocesan policies and procedures concerning sexual boundaries.

Theological Education

Education for Ministry

The Rev. Anne Moats Williams

This is the twenty-fifth year for Education for Ministry in this Diocese!

This year there were 54 active students with six groups active in Anamosa (at Anamosa State Penitentiary), Cedar Rapids, Davenport, Des Moines, Iowa City and Cedar Falls/Waterloo. This fall there will be another group, in Dubuque.

The Diocese has 15 active mentors and over 50 inactive mentors. There have been over 226 individuals graduate from EfM who are currently resident in the Diocese. Since the program began in this Diocese in 1986, there have been at least 28 individuals who have been ordained either to the permanent diaconate, to Canon 9 priesthood, or have gone on to 3-year seminary training after they participated in EfM. Plus there are countless members of the laity who have had their ministries enhanced and have gone on to serve in leadership positions in their parishes and communities. This unique educational curriculum is consistent with the diocesan long-range plan, particularly in the area of nurturing discipleship as it helps to develop an individual's spirituality and encourage mutual ministry. But it also in fosters evangelism as it prepares individuals to have the academic and theological background to be able to go out into the world and be witnesses to their faith.

There are two individuals in the state of Iowa who are trainers for the EfM program. One is the judicatory head of the Disciples of Christ, the Reverend Richard Guentert and the other is the Reverend Anne Moats Williams. In that capacity, they each travel to all parts of the country to train mentors in the EfM process.

eSeminary

The E-Seminary continues to offer classes for anyone who wishes to develop or expand their ministries either clergy or lay. The classes are now offered with the Diocesan sponsored MegaMeeting. Classes are offered each semester, and will fulfill the necessary requirements of lay ministry as well as the process toward ordination to Priesthood or Diaconate. Various classes in theology, pastoral theology, history, spirituality, ethics/morality, liturgy, and sacraments continue to be offered.

Summer Ministry School and Retreat

The 22nd annual Summer Ministries School and Retreat was held July 15-17, 2011 at Grinnell College. There were 104 participants including 8 youth and 70 participants in adult tracks, the youth choir, and the lively nursery with 5 young children. From the Diocesan theme of Our Anglican/Episcopal Identity, groups delved into the historic creeds, Benedictine heritage, the Episcopal Church in America, and the Reformation. This year two Bible study tracks were both well-subscribed and all 10 tracks were well-received. The Youth Choir reconvened and offered anthems for us both at Saturday Evensong and the Sunday Eucharist.

New this year were a labyrinth loaned by Kate Campbell; a Friday night optional meal from Grinnell's kitchen; the offering of prayer in American Sign Language from Donna Scarfe's track on Ministry with the Deaf. Service officiants came from throughout the diocese and we welcomed the return of Bishop Scarfe as celebrant and preacher Sunday morning.

Continuing challenges include: finding a weekend when more of us can come; finding a balance of theological, biblical, spiritual, and creative tracks to meet diverse needs; and expanding opportunities for our youth at the Ministries Retreat (lifelong learning and worship isn't just for adults). Fortunately, the generosity of our track leaders and the participants at our Sunday offering will allow us to give those on limited budgets opportunities to attend in the future.

The Ministries Retreat asks not just your prayers and your presence, but the energy of your ideas for tracks, Friday pre-conference short subjects, your willingness to share your passions to explore with others. Transition Ministry

Transition Ministry has been very active over the past year. The ministry assists parishes in the calling process. The time for calling new clergy leadership to a congregation has been called "Prime Time" for renewal. It is a time ripe in opportunity to build strength within the congregation and in the congregation's relationship with the diocese. Often during this period of time congregational conflicts will be addressed.

Parishes in transition continue to utilize the Church Assessment Tool (CAT) to survey the congregation in order to determine the vision, mission, and profile for new spiritual leadership. This tool would also benefit any parish involved in ministry development or strategic planning. This tool has been further developed to assist parishes in discovering the vitality of the parish.

Over the past year the National Office of Transition Ministry and Diocesan Transition Directors have assisted all registered clergy to convert their former profile to the new

Office of Transition Ministry Portfolio. The new Portfolio enhances the presentation of skills and talents of the clergy by allowing the clergy to answer multiple questions as they present their ministerial talents and skills in essay form. The parishes in transition also have a new Portfolio system as well. It appears that a clearer picture of clergy and parishes have emerged from this process.

Cursillo in Iowa has been stagnant and quiet for several years. Last summer, spurred by the Des Moines-area meeting of the National Episcopal Cursillo Committee, a small flame was sparked to work toward rebuilding our Iowa Cursillo community. To date, we have sent three pilgrims to neighboring dioceses and had four Cursillistas attend a Day of Deeper Understanding in Kansas City. But our main goal, rebuilding Iowa's existing Fourth Day community by reconnecting reunion groups and encouraging Ultreyas (community gatherings), has fallen short. This past year has been a focused attempt at establishing lists, sending correspondence, and reigniting the existing community; and the effort has failed. In the year to come, we will shift focus away from reinvigorating past Cursillistas and toward establishing a plan to move forward with a fresh start.

We still encourage the reestablishment of reunion groups or the beginning of new groups with those who have and those who haven't attended a weekend. Parishes are still encouraged to host Ultreyas and gather the community of Cursillistas as well as those who might be interested in attending a future weekend. Church World Service/CROP

On behalf of Church World Service/CROP, please accept my heartfelt thank you for your on-going support of the ministry we share in Christ's name.

Your support assisted the Iowa Region to receive over \$900,000 in income during Fiscal year 2011. Our CROP Hunger Event income increased over the previous fiscal year by almost \$45,000. Thousands of Iowans, including Episcopalians, contributed to this growth in resources, in spite of the economic challenges facing all of us. I give thanks to God and you for this ministry.

Episcopal Church members often participate in CROP Hunger Walks. There were over 90 Walks in Iowa last year. Six new CROP Walks were started in 2010 and early 2011, including new walks in Altoona/Runnells, Norwalk, Mt. Pleasant, Council Bluffs, Pery and Webster City. Deacon George Eldridge was the key organizer in Perry. The largest Walks in Iowa remain fairly stable from year to year. The Quad Cities, Muscatine, Ames, Iowa City, Cedar Rapids, Sioux City, Pella, De Witt, Cedar Falls/Waterloo, Clinton, and Dubuque are our largest CROP Walks in any given year. Des Moines hosts the annual Hunger Hike. Church World Service receives 40% of the Hunger Hike Income. Most of these Walks enjoy support and leadership from Episcopalians.

- o Iowa CWS income contributed to helping 157,00 people with a sustainable clean source of water, many for the first time.
- o CWS support meant that more than 60,000 people found sustainable sources of food through our work with agricultural co-operatives, farming instruction, community gardens and more.

- o In addition to working with refugees in situations like Darfur and the on-going displacement along the Thailand-Burma border, CWS resettled 7010 refugees in the U. S. CWS is one of seven agencies that facilitate refugee resettlement for the U. S. Department of State.
- o CWS distributed 24,200 family food packages to those affected by the floods in Pakistan. In addition, CWS provided 2010 tents and 1000 plastic sheets benefitting 88,000 people in Pakistan.
- o CWS, like many ministries, both religious and secular, responded to the needs of survivors following the Haiti earthquake.

Iowa Interfaith Power & Light is grateful to be in partnership with the Episcopal Diocese of Iowa in our mission to engage faith communities as leaders in addressing the environmental and social justice consequences of climate change.

Throughout this past year, our work has taken us into local communities to speak in congregational settings, host exhibits at environmental and community events, and provided opportunities for advocacy at both the state and federal level. We hosted our first annual "Faith in a Changing Climate" conference in West Des Moines in September 2011, and we were honored to have Bishop Alan Scarfe share a message with those gathered that provided encouragement in the pursuit of climate justice.

Our signature Cool Congregations program, begun by Sarah Webb and others in her home congregation of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Cedar Falls, continues to teach participants around the state how to become more energy efficient in their homes. We hosted four workshops during the past year, along with four follow-up events, and Sarah has recently traveled to three more states to share the program. Interfaith Power & Light has adopted Cool Congregations at the national level, and work is underway for an online carbon calculator to reach even more people with this wonderful program.

As people of faith, we believe we have a sacred duty to protect the gift of God's creation. We know that the poor and vulnerable both in the U.S. and around the world are disproportionately affected by climate disasters and other climate impacts, and we have a moral obligation to care for these sisters and brothers. We thank you for your continued efforts and the prayers and support that you provide for the work of Iowa Interfaith Power & Light.

In 2011 Iowa Religious Media Services, the official resource center/lending library of the Diocese of Iowa, celebrates twenty-five years of resource ministry to the Diocese and its five other denominational partners. A prime example of good stewardship and

ecumenical cooperation, IRMS launched this milestone anniversary year at a special Annual Meeting in January where denominational leaders re-signed the covenant that undergirds this shared ministry – doing together what none could do as well individually.

The focal point of our anniversary year came on September 17, when IRMS hosted its third conference “RE:image 2011 – Techniques and Technologies for Tomorrow’s Church.” Paul Nixon, author of *I Refuse to Lead a Dying Church*, provided the keynote address highlighting churches that refused to die. Meg Wagner (Iowa City, Trinity) was a featured breakout presenter, addressing the contemporary topic of *Connecting with Youth in a Digital Age or @Youth: What Would Jesus Tweet? #digital information*. If you don’t know what those words mean, you need to speak to Meg! Producing RE: image was our birthday gift to our denominations, a thank you for 25 years of covenanted support!

While RE:image is a significant IRMS resource, our main function is to provide relevant Christian education and worship material to individual congregations. As the official Diocesan resource center/lending library, IRMS offers DVDs, kits, videotapes, books, audiotapes and an assortment of dramas, CDs, CD-Rom and maps. We even have a 36-foot hand-painted canvas indoor labyrinth – available exclusively to subscriber churches! With more than 15,200 resources including 8,400 titles, our collection has materials to support congregations in the areas of stewardship, hospitality and evangelism, Episcopal-Anglican identity, leadership development, Bible study, spiritual growth, creation care, world religions, parenting and, of course, Christian education materials for all ages. Through IRMS you can see how different denominations approach such topics as church growth, faith formation, and worship. In exchange for a modest annual subscription fee, all these resources are available to subscriber churches at no additional charge.

Supplementing our other services, each year IRMS enjoys participation in the Annual Convention in Des Moines and the Episcopal Ministry Summer School and Retreat in Grinnell, where we provide resources for the track leaders.

Because we are a significant programming arm of each of our covenanting denominations, IRMS is affected by the same issues faced by mainline denominations today – declining church membership, churches closing, lack of resources, smaller staff, tightening budgets, and the over-arching requirement to do more with less.

Even so, we continue to expand into our mission of providing children, youth and adults with the best available materials. Since 2001 IRMS annually invests \$15000 in new resources to meet the evolving needs of our clients and to maintain the relevance of our unique collection now valued at over a half-million dollars. The rest of our budget covers staff salaries, rent, utilities, insurance, communications, and all the things that keep an office running. IRMS does not provide insurance or pension benefits to our staff.

A vital part of the Diocesan strategic plan, IRMS is a resource to help both the Diocese and individual congregations address the vision of the One Church Many Locations plan for ministry. The purpose of IRMS and the Diocesan strategic plan align on Anglican-Episcopal Identity. The covenant of IRMS affirms that “Iowa Religious Media Services will reflect a knowledge of the traditions and practices of all participating churches and denominations in its staffing, purchasing, consultations, workshops, educational practices and training.” We acknowledge and support Anglican-Episcopal identity in all our practices and offer resources to support this unique tradition. In addition, IRMS is a charter member of the National Organization of Episcopal Resource Centers (NOERC), an important link to resource information from Dioceses throughout the national church.

Because IRMS is a shared ministry, not only within the Diocese but also with its covenanting partners, it is a key example of thoughtful stewardship, broad-based cooperation, and long-term ecumenical ministry. Through this Diocesan partnership, Episcopalians in Iowa claim ownership of one of the largest and most respected resource centers in the nation, with a professional staff and a vast collection of resources. At this writing, Diocesan representatives to IRMS Board of Directors include Jeanie Smith, our longtime treasurer, and Andi Baker, who is also serving on our Preview Committee.
