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From Bishop Monnot

It is springtime, and when I look out the window at the tiny, light green leaves on the large oak tree on my front lawn, I am reminded that this is a time of transition and transformation. Those leaves are growing larger and darker, and soon will be at full strength, collecting sunlight and manufacturing energy for the tree all summer long.

It's not just my oak tree: the rest of our world is in transition also. We are moving further away from the worst parts of the COVID-19 pandemic, discovering and putting to use the lessons that we learned. The political landscape is changing, both in Iowa and on a national and even international level. The effects of global climate change are becoming easier to see on local levels.

Our churches and our diocese are also experiencing transition. This began long before the pandemic came along, but the pandemic brought it into sharper focus. Many of our churches were already seeing their attendance numbers, giving numbers, and overall engagement decline. Since reopening after the pandemic, most of our churches have not returned to pre-pandemic levels in these areas.

Times of transition can be hard and scary, because we don't necessarily know where we are going. Eventually, my oak tree will transition from actively growing and shading my home to dying and likely being taken down and ground up for mulch, giving life and protection to other plants in a completely different form. If the oak tree could think, it wouldn't be able to imagine what that transition would be like, or what it would gain after giving up everything it knows about being a tree. The ability of the tree to nurture new

life is an example of transformation that can arise when we embrace transition.

Times of transition and transformation can be energizing and exciting, if we are able to be open to change and experimentation, and if we have a core of resilience. If we have confidence that we are living the resurrected life of Christ, grounded in the gospel and following God's call, we recognize that transition, and the transformation that accompanies it, are necessary parts of our Christian journey. Transition and transformation are patterned in the very fabric of creation, as my oak tree demonstrates.

In one of Richard Rohr's recent daily reflections (I highly recommend these, you can sign up here), Richard used the image from the Book of Revelation (3:20) of Jesus standing at the door; "Behold, I stand at the door and knock." The context of this verse is a message to a church that is timid in its faith, "neither cold nor hot" (3:15), comfortable in its life and not willing to take meaningful steps into the life that Jesus promises. Jesus tells them to let him in so that they may learn to live into the fullness of life with him.

The first step is to open the door to Jesus, and I expect that, as Christians, we have opened that door, and seen Jesus standing on the other side of the threshold. We may have invited Jesus in to our hearts and our homes, and opened ourselves to the transformation that he brings. We may be able to recognize that we are changed in ourselves because of our transformation in Christ.

I want to extend the image of Jesus on the other side of the threshold further, and imagine not only that he comes in to be with us in our own homes, inviting us to personal transformation in our own hearts and lives, but also that he invites us out into a new world and into a new way of being with him.

When we have the courage to step over the threshold into the unknown, out into the world, led by Jesus, we move into a time of not only personal transformation, but transformation of the world around us. We can find that courage in the bedrock of our faith, our own relationship with Jesus, and we find companionship with other Christians, so we don't have to go out alone.

Stepping over the threshold is the transition that we in our diocese are called to at this time. As we follow Jesus into the world together, our communities will be transformed and so will the world around us. Some day when my oak tree dies a natural death, it could remain standing for a long time, looking strong even as it weakens inside. Or it could be transformed into a form that gives nourishment and protection to new life. It is for us to decide as communities whether we will cross that threshold boldly in faith, following Jesus' call, or remain inside, content with our own personal relationship with God, resisting further transition and transformation. I hope that, together, we will find the courage to step through the door and follow Jesus out into the world, ready to embrace the transformation that awaits us there.



Gather at the River: Young Adult Companion Pilgrimage



2022 Recipient Spotlight:



Behavioral Health Ministry Team in partnership with Rev. Kris Leaman & Amy Mellies -- \$5,000

Last year, a GILEAD Seed Grant helped fund the forming of a diocesan Behavioral Health Ministry Team (BHMT). The team is composed of clergy, laity and community advisors in the fields of mental health, and works to identify, support, and lend assistance to clergy, parishes, families and all those in between with mental health needs. BHMT is committed to building a support system and referral resources for all in the diocese, and thus worked to build partnerships with mental health organizations such as L.E.A.D., Mindspring Mental Health Alliance, NAMI of Central Iowa, and the Des Moines Pastoral Counseling Center. With this grant, BHMT hopes to strengthen their ministry by expanding outreach opportunities, partnerships, and trainings/educational workshops. GILEAD Grant funds will be used to help cover the cost of offering and/or participating in trainings and educational workshops, consultation fees with partner organizations, and other materials/educational resources.


Clergy Support at St. Andrew's, Des Moines -- \$24,000

St. Andrew's has embraced mutual ministry through a team-based ministry structure and established many new relationships that have led to ministry partnerships. Rev. Lizzie has been an integral part of Mutual Ministry to bring St. Andrew's into a post-pandemic world, building intentional relationships with the community, city, and organizations, helping to chart an innovative, sustainable course for the congregation. She's built a partnership with the Northwest Community fridge, which led to St. Andrew's housing the fridge on their property when the fridge was forced to relocate - check out the recent ENS article featuring this story! She's worked with Deacon Mahr to form a relationship with Lutheran Service in Iowa, which has led to St. Andrew's becoming a site for LSI's Global Greens garden program for refugees; she takes an active role in community events, including City Council meetings, Neighborhood Associate meetings, vigils at the Des Moines police station, serves as a Courtroom Chaplain to support families (several defendants were charged with crimes connected to Black Lives Matter protests), and more. GILEAD Grant funds will be used to help pay Rev. Lizzie Gillman's salary and benefits.
