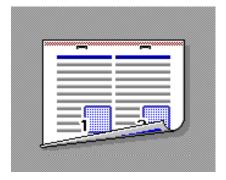

Province VI

Province VI Ellen Bruckner, Province VI Coordinator

In May of 2019, Province VI gathered people from each diocese for a visioning/direction setting session in Minneapolis. All eight diocese were represented in the conversation. After spending time looking at resources and how the province can help the dioceses in ministry, it has been recommended that Province VI consider employing a part time communications person. Many people in the province do not know the purpose or activity of the province and how a province might be able to help a diocese in its ministry. Province VI may need to grow the networks by seeking people in the dioceses who participate in like ministries and finding ways of connecting these people across diocesan lines for sharing and supporting their shared ministries. The focus will be developing the communication strategy for the Province.

Six of our eight dioceses have experienced or are experiencing a transition in the episcopate in 2019. This creates some "wait" time for the Province since it takes a while for a new bishop to transition into the diocese and then begin thinking about a wider view, including the ways of collaborating in the province. There may be some changes in the way Province VI operates in 2020 due to these transitions.

Disciplinary Board The Rt. Rev. Alan Scarfe

The Disciplinary Board president and Church Attorney were consulted in the process which resulted in an Accord, temporarily suspending priest Curtis Moermond, through mid-July 2019.

Standing Committee—Official Actions August 2018 to August 2019 The Rev. Elizabeth Duff-Popplewell, Standing Committee President

These are the actions taken by the Standing Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Iowa during the time period of August 2018 and August 2019:

Ordinations were approved for Nicola Bowler (transitional diaconate); and James "Jake" Andrews III (presbyteral) to be ordained in the Diocese of Spokane on behalf of Iowa on November 20, 2018.

Candidacy was approved for Elizabeth Gillman, Stephanie Jones, and Jennifer Latham on April 6, 2019.

Consent to Ordination to the Priesthood was given to The Rev. Zebulun Treloar and The Rev. Nicola Bowler on April 6, 2019.

Real estate sale and orderly transfer of ministry at Trinity, Denison, was approved on December 19, 2018.

At Trinity, Iowa City, consent was given to rent a small strip of land to the City of Iowa City for a period of time not to exceed one year. Consent was also given for the sale of a parcel of land to the City of Iowa City for construction purposes on December 19, 2018.

COMMISSION ON JUSTICE, PEACE AND INTEGRITY OF CREATION

Chemical Dependency Committee Ms. Patti Christensen, Chair

The Diocesan Chemical Dependency Program maintains a network of both laity and clergy who are ready and willing to assist local churches in pastoral care to those with substance abuse issues and those who love them.

We continue to sponsor semiannual "Pathways to Serenity" retreats each spring and fall which focus on the 12-steps as articulated by Alcoholics Anonymous. In 2019 we celebrate 35 years of sharing God's love via Pathways Retreats and this year's fall retreat is the 67th one. We see the Spirit of God working evangelistically in the lives of those attending through the love, hope, and acceptance this church offers at these retreats - often to unchurched, or people of other denominations.

There are some scholarships available via the "Friends of Pathways" Fund (which accepts donations) because we do not want insufficient financial resources to keep anyone away from Pathways Retreats. The cost of the Pathways Retreat is currently \$80.00 per person.

Creation Care Ministry Jenn Latham

The Creation Care Ministry includes the completion of projects that were funded by the national church's Creation Stewards grants.

In Grinnell at St. Paul's, the postage stamp prairie has been planted and is becoming established. In addition to the planting of native species, the project also included installation of permeable pavers to help slow down and reduce the amount of storm runoff from rooftops and concrete into storm drains. Educational signage has also been placed by the sidewalk which explains the prairie and pavers' role in protecting the Little Bear Creek watershed. The space is available for educational visits to help show community members how urban areas can also implement practices that help our local environment. Situated in the midst of the prairie, the pavers and new benches also provide a space for quiet contemplation and prayer.

At Trinity in Emmetsburg, the Prayer Garden has provided a harvest of wildflowers and "prayers." Within the first year, the wildflowers were blooming around the Celtic Cross that was landscaped into the soil. A bench invites passers-by to take a break and rest, reflect and pray. A wooden prayer box labeled as such is opened weekly and prayers are honored during the weekly Eucharist. Recently photos were taken of a wedding party that had chosen to record the date/event. The photographer said the Trinity Prayer Garden is used frequently for such occasions even by those not being married at Trinity. The garden is tended by Trinity volunteers and a permanent sign describes the various wildflowers seen in the garden. Recently, the Celtic Cross provided a venue for Trinity's 140thanniversary reception which included cake and beverages for members of the community who wanted to honor the occasion. Community members frequently comment on how the garden setting and the flowers have improved the esthetics of the vacant lot which heretofore had been an unattractive nuisance, especially on a windy day.

This year we hope to develop a Care for Creation formation program to be shared with churches who would like to use it, and we plan to be involved in advocacy at the state level for legislation that supports protecting our waterways and environment.

"Faith in Action" and Diocese of Iowa Lobbyist The Rev. Wendy Abrahamson

At the completion of the third year of "Faith in Action" our ministry continued along the same path as in previous years. The Facebook group did a good job of keeping lowa Episcopalians informed on legislation in the lowa General Assembly, advocacy issues of importance to people of faith, and various gatherings such as "Lights for Liberty" a national gathering of support asking for humane treatment of those taken by ICE and being held in US detention centers.

Our third annual *Episcopalians on the Hill* day brought nice group of Episcopalians to the Iowa Statehouse, where we met with Sen. Rob Hogg and Rep. Bob Kressig and then went to speak with our own members of the Iowa General Assembly on bills the Diocese of Iowa registered support or opposition for. Concluding the day we debriefed with ideas for improving this work, such as having a pre-gathering meeting for people to learn more about bills before coming to the Statehouse.

The registered lobbyist, The Rev. Wendy K. Abrahamson, followed specific topics in consultation with Bishop Scarfe, all in keeping with the mind of General Convention and the Diocese of Iowa. She also attended Ecumenical Advocacy Days in Washington DC and took workshops on lobbying, culminating in opportunities to lobby members of the US Congress.

For the upcoming year "Faith in Action" will work to expand and improve *Episcopalians on the Hill*, and work to build a small lobbying team for the Diocese.

Prison Ministry The Rev. Anne Williams

The Episcopal Diocese of Iowa has numerous locations where ministry to those affected by incarceration is carried out. There are individuals and groups in all areas of the Diocese to whom this ministry is vital. Some are visiting our state and local prisons and jails while others are engaged in restorative justice ministries and ministries to the victims of crime and the families of the incarcerated and in ministries that hope to intervene in the poverty-crime cycle.

There are Episcopalians engaged in active prison ministry in at least eight areas of the Diocese – in the Linn County Jail (Maridee Dugger), Blackhawk County Jail and Jeremiah House in Waterloo (Chuck Lane), Mitchellville Women's Correctional Facility (Carol Kramer and Jeannie Smith), Davenport (Larry Thomas), Anamosa State Penitentiary (Anne Williams), and Richard Winemiller (Iowa Medical Correctional Center at Oakdale). In addition, there are many others who provide on-going religious support to the incarcerated who are members of their individual congregations.

At Anamosa State Penitentiary, there is an EfM (Education for Ministry) group that is starting its sixteenth year, has impacted seventy-four men, and graduated twenty-one. This fall, seven new men are joining the group, one is returning to resume his work after taking a break from the program, and four are in mid-program.

MULTICULTURAL COMMISSION

Beloved Community Initiative

The Rev.'s Meg Wagner and Susanne Watson Epting, Co-Founders Lisa Covington, Program Coordinator

The young African American woman stood confidently before a crowd of over 200 to introduce Dr. Jeanette Epps, one of two African American astronauts with NASA. "I had the privilege of meeting Dr. Epps a few years ago," she said. "Dr. Epps gave me good advice about what courses to take, including some Russian language. I did what she suggested, and today I am an engineer at Collins Aerospace."

The crowd erupted spontaneously, springing to their feet to affirm both Dr. Epps and the young woman who is following her dream.

It's a little different way of being church-—and yet with the ongoing assistance of a Genesis grant from The Episcopal Church, we continue our mission toward racial justice, healing and reconciliation. On behalf of the Diocese of Iowa, the Beloved Community Initiative continues to serve as a resource for dismantling racism both in our own churches, as well as in the local community.

In February, the co-sponsorship of a program to bring Dr. Epps to Iowa City was representative of so much of what we do. Working with the Iowa City School District, Fastrac (a program to help teens overcome barriers to their education), and FilmScene, we hosted over 200 people at a soul food dinner and movie screening of "Hidden Figures."

In March, we worked with Iowa Mennonite School and many community partners, as we hosted high school students for a week-long immersion program. Students met and learned from a member of the Meskwaki Tribal Council, the local Rabbi, a community of Sudanese immigrants, and others. They stayed overnight at Old Brick, had the opportunity to volunteer at the Agape Café, and participated in a workshop with Jamel Nelson on envisioning and creating equitable communities.

The same month, we hosted over 50 people of faith as they explored with Dr. Jennifer Harvey, "Which Way to Justice? Dismantling Racism as a Spiritual Practice." It is our hope that, over time, more and more people of faith will realize that this work toward racial justice is life-long work.

It has been a joy to welcome Lisa Covington, with the help of an Episcopal Church United Thank Offering grant, as our program coordinator this year. With her connections to both the University of lowa and the community, she has introduced and incorporated new people into our work. She has also participated in working with our diocesan trainers and has done some consulting around a civil rights pilgrimage. In fact, the Beloved Community Initiative hosted a pilgrimage to an Underground Railroad site during Palm Sunday weekend. Participants were able to reflect theologically on this history and consider the meaning of risk-taking then and now.

Lisa also connected us with The AfroHouse at the University of Iowa and the Black Leadership Institute. In May, over 200 people came to celebrate the annual graduation ceremony specifically for African American students at The University of Iowa. The AfroHouse, the Black Leadership Institute and Beloved Community Initiative planned and hosted the celebration of the 2019 graduates. Graduation ceremonies for students of color at predominantly white institutions allow students to be able to hold space as a community without judgement or micro-agressions from a campus community that is often isolating.

Space prohibits a full discussion of all the events and relationships that have taken place over this last year, but additional highlights include:

- Offering dinner and fellowship called "Soul Tending for Change-Makers"
- Regular hosting of the Johnson County Interfaith Coalition and Native American AA group
- Periodic hosting of other meditation and community planning groups
- Ongoing training for Episcopal Diocese of Iowa congregations in dismantling racism

• Co-hosting (with Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America) a "Humanize my Hoodie" training for white allies and accomplices

In addition, our thoughts have turned toward sustainability, and especially bringing additional people into our work in a systematic way. Two new advisory groups have been established, one a diocesan group, and the other a community group. We're excited at the new ideas and energy that are being generated, including exploring what Beloved Community might look like behind prison walls, and establishing a reading camp or camps to work toward improving literacy rates. We'll also explore the idea of a regular worship community and an interfaith book group.

We are grateful to the people of the Diocese of Iowa for supporting our work, and for the ongoing commitment to work toward racial justice, healing and reconciliation.

St. Paul's Indian Mission, Sioux City, Iowa The Rev. Dr. Marilyn van Duffelen, Vicar

As of the writing of this report, St. Paul's Indian Mission continues on budget. We received a clean independent audit, as we did last year. All financial transactions were imported from Quicken into a new software program, QuickBooks, so that it is consistent with the Diocesan financial software. Last year we received a further \$3000.00 grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel to Indians and other peoples. This allowed us to complete the installation of new carpeting in the Sunday School room and the priest's office. This year, we have received a further \$5000.00 grant from the same Society, which will be used to replace all the lighting in the basement and hallways with LED fixtures. It will also be used to refurbish the two toilets with new fixtures. We are very grateful for the Society's continued support of St. Paul's Indian Mission.

The healing and reconciliation between the Omaha people and St. Paul's Indian Mission continues. On two occasions, a young Omaha man sang a "Thank you" song in his language and accompanied himself with our hand drum. Both of these occasions were baptisms. This participation of Omaha people is a new event in the history of this mission. It was proceeded by the funeral of Carol Buffalo Chief, an Omaha woman, at St. Paul's, which was the first Omaha funeral in it's history. We are grateful to observe this continued engagement of the Omaha people with St. Paul's Indian Mission.

Our Sunday Meal Outreach continues unabated, and the numbers of those served is slowly growing. RTF no longer provides people for community service as they have terminated that

program. We are still struggling to find members for building maintenance. We continue to offer personal hygiene articles and clothing to those in need, with the support of donations from other churches.

This year St. Paul's participated in an interstate activism event. For the past five years, the Sacred Horse Society has engaged in a ten day ride to honor the suffering and death of native women and children due to the mass relocations of native peoples following the hanging of the 38 + 2. This year the ride organizers asked Sto-wahi' quilting guild to create a hand-made quilt depicting the women and children being honored and remembered. Members of the church are members of Sto-wahi' Quilting Guild, which meets weekly in South Sioux City NE and they participated in the quilt-making. Upon completion of the ride in Pierre, SD the quilt was presented to the State Legislature for display. A plaque will be created with the names of the quilters and the symbolism of the quilt, and it will be displayed in the State Legislature Building. The quilt-makers plan to attend the dedication.

I have reinstituted Summer Bible School, with 4 attending the July program. I hope to repeat the program in August and segue into a Sunday School program in September, depending on the volunteer situation.

We are collaborating with the Department of Human Services, Native Division, to offer culturally appropriate educational movies one Saturday each month. This will continue for five occasions, at which time the success of the program will be accessed to determine its future. We are also making plans to collaborate on crafting workshops for children. At the current time, the church is open Tuesday evenings, and people gather to spend time crafting together. Examples are bead work, star quilt making, and ribbon skirt making. In cooperation with DHS, we hope to offer workshops for children to learn these crafts, taught by St. Paul members and also by members of the larger native community.

Finally, St. Paul's will be hosting Fatherhood is Sacred/Motherhood is Sacred sessions on Thursday evenings from August Until December. They will be taught by Terry Medina and financed by DHS. This will engage more members of the larger native population with St. Paul's and provide opportunities for evangelism.

COMMISSION ON ONE WORLD, ONE CHURCH (OWOC) David Oakland, Convener

This has been an exciting year for the companion relationships. Bishop Andrew Swift is completing his first year as Bishop of Brechin; by the time our Convention is held The Rev. Stacey Gerhart will have returned from a three-month ministry in the Diocese of Swaziland; Bishop Samuel Peni is now Archbishop Samuel Peni—serving as Bishop of Yambio and Archbishop of Western Equatoria (which includes Nzara). With his move, the Diocese of Nzara has a new Bishop, Richard M. Aquilla. Bishop Aquilla plans to attend our Diocesan Convention.

Ray Gaebler's Nzara Companions report includes information about the Synod in Nzara, the visits that have occurred this year, and the various project which are underway. Stacey Gerhart's Diocese of Swaziland report covers the many activities of that companion.

On September 30, six Iowans (Bishop Alan and Donna Scarfe, Jerry Davenport, Amy Mellies, The Rev. Kathleen Milligan, and The Rev. Melody Rockwell) will meet Bishop Andrew Swift and Pat Millar from Brechin and Douglas Viets (a friend of Jerry's from their winter church in Florida) in Johannesburg for the drive to Eswatini. They will be present for their Diocesan Synod (convention) in early October. Melody, Jerry, Douglas, and Stacey Gerhart will stay for another week to be involved in projects there before returning home in mid-October.

Our Global Missioner, The Rev. Canon Suzanne Peterson, was unable to attend the Global Episcopal Mission Network (GEMN) Workshop. This is a workshop which has enriched the work of our Commission for many years and we continue to maintain our membership.

Ecumenical and Interfaith Officer, The Rev. Jean McCarthy, and The Rev. Zeb Treloar attended the National Workshop on Christian Unity. This is also an event that has contributed richly to our Commission life each year.

2019 International/Sustainable Development Mini-grants are awarded as follows:

Diocese of Swaziland – Expansion of the Piggery: \$3,500

Diocese of Nzara – Birthing Center Supplies: \$3,000

Diocese of Southeast Florida Episcopal Charities – emergency Hurricane Dorian relief funds for their companion Diocese of the Bahamas: \$1,658

The Dioceses of Brechin, Iowa, and Swaziland plan to gather young adults in Iowa in August 2020. Amy Mellies and Traci Petty of the Diocesan staff are working to organize that activity with an emphasis on environmental issues.

Companions of Nzara Ray Gaebler, coordinator

History

In October of 2008, The Rev. Samuel Peni was a student at Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa. The curriculum required the January term be "an inter-cultural experience." Most of his fellow students planned mission trips to Latin America or overseas. Samuel convinced the seminary that being in America, he was living an inter-cultural experience every day. One of his first activities was to increase his understanding of the Episcopal Church in America. He attended the 2008 Diocese of Iowa Convention with delegates from St. John's Church in Dubuque. During the Convention, he met The Rev. Mary Cole-Duvall and The Rev. Milton Cole-Duvall. They invited Rev. Samuel to serve a month's internship in the St. Timothy's Church Community in West Des Moines. Since 2008 there have been changes for both Rev. Samuel and the Diocese of Iowa. When Samuel returned to South Sudan after spring graduation, the new Diocese of Nzara was established. The Rt. Rev. Samuel Enosa Peni was installed as the first Bishop. By 2012 the growing Iowa/Nzara relationship was formalized as Companion Dioceses. This relationship was renewed for another five years in 2017.

The Situation in South Sudan

The situation in South Sudan is hopeful. On July 9, 2011 South Sudan celebrated independence from Sudan. In December 2013 civil war erupted. Since then several ceasefire and peace agreements were signed but none of them lasted. The present peace agreement was signed September 12, 2018. This time there is cautious optimism as parties to the agreement appear to have more regard and hope for a positive outcome. However, implementation of key provisions is substantially behind schedule. Some international leaders are concerned that the process may not hold.

Mutual Visits

Because the overall environment in Nzara has been relatively secure this year, Bishop Peni is comfortable inviting foreign visitors. Mutual visits help build trust and person-to-person relationships.

Bishop Peni came to our 2018 annual convention and participated in all activities. He had the opportunity to meet Presiding Bishop Curry and Bishop Epting and to congratulate Cathleen Bascom on her election as the new bishop of Kansas. He was able to greet Bishop Swift of Brechin.

Sadly, on Saturday during Convention, Bishop Peni was notified his lifelong friend, Bishop Peter Mundi, had died of cancer. Peter Mundi was Bishop of Yambio and Archbishop of the Internal Province of Western Equatoria. Bishop Peni cut short his visit to Iowa and hurried home to arrange for the funeral.

In February 2019, Bishop Scarfe, accompanied by The Rev. Mel Schlachter, Abigail Livingood and Marcy Luft, visited Nzara. (Abigail and Marcy are members of St. Timothy's.) A major highlight of the trip was the dedication of new school buildings built with the support of the United Thank Offering.

In March 2019, Bishop Peni was elected Bishop of Yambio and Archbishop of the Internal Province of Western Equatoria. The Province is composed of six separate Dioceses. The election was March 7th, the installation on March10, 2019. During the transition, another good friend of Archbishop Samuel visited. The Rev. Milton Cole-Duvall is a Canon of All Saint's Episcopal Cathedral in Nzara. He participated in Bp. Samuel's last official service as bishop in Nzara on Palm Sunday and, also, on Easter Sunday at Bp. Peni's first official service in Yambio as the new bishop and Archbishop of Western Equatoria. In addition to his responsibilities for the Province and the Diocese of Yambio, Archbishop Peni continues to advise the Justice, Peace and Reconciliation Commission and participate in the National Dialogue. Archbishop Peni returned to lowa and was honored in May 2019 when Wartburg Seminary awarded him an honorary Doctor of Ministry Degree. During this visit he had the opportunity to attend an lowa clergy conference and also visit with Bishop Cathleen Bascom to explore possibilities of establishing a Kansas/Yambio Companionship. We are blessed knowing this remarkable and faithfilled man. We wish him God's Blessing in his new work. He will always have a special place in our hearts.

Looking Ahead

On August 11, 2019, the Rt. Rev. Richard Mbikoyesu Aquilla, was consecrated and enthroned as the second Bishop of Nzara. The Rev. Elizabeth Popplewell and her husband, Dennis Popplewell represented the Diocese of Iowa at the celebration. Bishop Richard previously served as Dean of All Saints Cathedral in Nzara.

In addition to prayers and exchange visits the companionship focuses together with the people of Nzara on their three priorities; Evangelism, Health and Education. Iowans support evangelism with "Soap and Salt." Clergy in Nzara, including the bishop, do not receive monetary compensation. Villagers help them with their family gardens and share some food from their own gardens. Each month the clergy gather in Nzara to report on the month's activities. They are given a ration of soap for hygiene and salt to flavor their food. Many Iowa parishes, even the smallest, have raised funds for this.

We also support Nzara priorities through Diocese of Iowa International Development Grants. In November a \$3100 grant was privately funded to support a week of retreat and training for the Mother's Union. The Mother's Union in Nzara is 1100 women strong and is a primary force for evangelism, outreach, and care.

Another International Development Grant supported health and education. \$2000 was disbursed to support three schoolteachers studying at Kampala International University. \$1200 was disbursed to support a Public Health Student at Uganda Christian University. These grants address a huge shortage in South Sudan. Because of the long fight for freedom, South Sudan has very few indigenous schoolteachers or health workers.

The Episcopal Church United Thank Offering has been most generous in supporting our companion relationship. As mentioned above, the United Thank Offering financed two new school buildings for St. Timothy's Pre & Primary School. They donated \$44,372 for this project. (Additional funds from The United Kingdom financed a third building.) For the first time since the school began all the children can be inside for learning. Previously most classes met under mango trees. The children had to go home when it rained. This School serves approximately 2000 students. It is ranked number one in the state.

The United Thank Offering is helping meet the health goals with a grant to renovate the Good Samaritan Primary Health Care Clinic and greatly upgrade the Mid-Wife and Birthing services. This was one of the first efforts to improve health when the Diocese of Nzara was established. Trained midwives with certification and regular refresher training lead the effort. A network of Traditional Birth Attendants assist and reach out to remote areas of the diocese. The clinic in Nzara includes a birthing center to improve maternal and infant safety during delivery. Programs for pre-natal and post-natal care have been established. The Midwives and Traditional Birth Attendants have saved many lives. However, the civil war and inflation has taken a toll. The clinic is in serious disrepair. The birthing facilities are barely adequate. The United Thank Offering grant of \$28,520 will help renovate the clinic plus provide better tools and equipment. It will even provide bicycles so the Traditional Birth Attendants can reach remote women needing help.

Last year we reported wonderful news. In the spring of 2018 Aqua-Africa installed the first ever water tower in Nzara and a distribution system to supply the village with dependable safe drinking water. Aqua-Africa is a Non-governmental organization (NGO) in Omaha, Nebraska. May God bless them. They do not just build and leave. When Aqua-Africa builds a facility, they conduct Micro-Democracy training for the village. This prepares villagers to operate and pay for the system going forward. They also provide maintenance training and stay involved for five years. Early in 2019 the new water system was disabled. Aqua-Africa expedited the repair.

Knowing that Nzara Diocese is not just Nzara town, Buey Tut of Aqua-Africa and Bp. Peni worked out a plan to drill bore holes and install hand pumps in smaller villages. This will be financed by Rotary International and The Rotary Club of Wausau, WI. The Diocese of Iowa will supplement the Rotary Grants with \$10,000.

The Rev. Bob North and his wife, Karen, spent two years in Nzara. Karen taught English classes and is updating the Zande/English Dictionary. Fr. Bob raised money to buy a dump truck. This truck has been critical; moving construction materials for a conference center, the clinic, the diocesan office, a computer center and seven tukals (small homes) for staff and visitors, plus the new school and other infrastructure projects. On many of these projects Fr. Bob helped with the design and supervision of the construction. He and Karen also raised substantial funds over the years to support students and help pay the clinic staff.

Father North will visit Nzara in September of this year. While there he will help build benches for the school. He also plans to survey the water needs of remote villages in order to continue expanding access to safe water.

The interim peace plan signed last fall brought a measure of calm in the country. Pray for peace. Nzara's parishes are listed for our daily prayers in the Joint Intercession List on the Diocese of Iowa website: <u>https://www.iowaepiscopal.org/Ministries/prayer.html</u>

Companions of the Diocese of Swaziland in Eswatini The Rev. Stacey Gerhart, coordinator

The Diocese of Swaziland, our long-standing companion in the country renamed Eswatini, has had its share of ups and downs this year. The economy in Eswatini is down but the rainfall in central and northern parts of the country have finally been plentiful for which we thank God.

One project highlight of 2019 is the success of the Diocesan piggery in Luve which was started in 2016 with a UTO grant sponsored by the Diocese of Iowa. The piggery's profitability has afforded the opportunity to expand the operation; a portion of income was reinvested to purchase 4 more sows so now they have 15 sows and 1 boar. With the help of a \$3500 OWOC Development Mini Grant this year the piggery will expand its facility to include another 8 stalls to house the weaned piglets while they grow to market-size in 3 months. St. Andrew's Church in Luve gave permission for the piggery to use adjacent land on which they will grow yellow maize. This will help cut down on costs for feeding the pigs. When the piggery workers finish moving the barbed wire fencing to the new perimeter, they will till and plant. Profits from the piggery help fund the Diocese's social development grants. Another success has been the reforestation project at Usutho Mission.

This year the Diocese of Swaziland, sponsored by the Diocese of Iowa, received a UTO grant for E2 million (approximately \$140,000 U.S.) to build 2 hostels (apartment buildings) for students attending the agricultural college in Luyengo. Construction complications have delayed the opening of the first building.

The water harvesting and gardening projects around the diocese have not panned out as hoped. The drought in the south was the demise of water harvesting and gardening at Mbava. Other gardens have failed because of lack of commitment from the local communities.

The 15 Neighborhood Care Points (NCP), with financial assistance from the Diocese of Iowa, continue to play a vital role in providing food for orphans. The NCP's are monitored on a regular basis to make certain that the neediest places in the diocese are being served.

At the invitation of Bishop Wamukoya, the Rev. Stacey Gerhart served in the Diocese of Swaziland for 3 months this summer. She alternated assisting at the Cathedral in Mbabane and at St. George's and St. James in Manzini. It was a rich and rewarding experience for everyone involved.

Bishop Ellinah is keen to emphasize that although the financial assistance is a big help, the greatest benefit of the diocesan companionships is the relationships. The personal connections and the prayers nurture hope.

COMMISSION ON STEWARDSHIP AND PLANNED GIVING Anne Wagner, Diocesan Comptroller

The Stewardship Commission has been without a Chair over the past year, and has not been as active as in the past. The Stewardship Commission is encouraging congregations to take advantage

of 3-years of online stewardship tools, resources, and webinars through Church Development offered as part of the GILEAD Diocesan Campaign <u>https://www.church-development.com/gilead account signup</u>. Investment Committee

Mr. William H. Smith, Jr., Treasurer and Ms. Anne Wagner, Assistant Treasurer

The primary responsibility of the Investment Committee is to review and evaluate the performance of investments of the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa and to advise the Board of Directors on these investments.

Our largest investment fund, the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund, was established in 1959 and offers a convenient, professionally managed investment fund for the congregations of the Diocese of Iowa, and some of the special purpose funds given to the Diocese. By creating a common pool of diocesan and congregational investable funds, participants are able to invest in a well-diversified portfolio. The Foundation Fund is managed by the Episcopal Church Foundation, in partnership with State Street Global Advisors.

The Episcopate Fund was established by the Sixth Bishop of Iowa and his wife, Gordon V and Florence K. Smith, and is intended to help underwrite the annual compensation package for the Bishop of Iowa. It provides for 65% of the bishop's compensation package. The Episcopate Fund has been managed by Wells Fargo Advisors.

We have a socially responsible fund invested with the Sustainability Group. It invests in projects such as loans for low-income housing, and economic opportunity and development.

Ways and Means Committee Ms. Anne Wagner

The Ways & Means Committee oversees the preparation, presentation and funding of the annual Diocesan budget; monitors current year income and expenditures, congregational pledges, parochial reports, and audits. They report to the Board of Directors.

OLDER ADULT MINISTRY DEVELOPMENT TEAM Jenn Latham

The Diocese of Iowa's Older Adult Ministry Development Team seeks to support churches in ministry among and for older adults. Their overall mission is to encourage and assist congregations in beginning a conversation around the issues of aging. The OAMDT has a vision that each congregation will be a place where people of all ages are welcomed and valued and where the churches of the Diocese of Iowa will provide resources and assistance to its members as they go through the lifelong process of aging. With the death of team leader, The Rev. Warren Frelund, in 2018 the OAMDT has been on hiatus and hopes to begin meeting again in 2019-20. We welcome to the work of the group any who feel called to this ministry. Join us by contacting the Diocesan Office.

YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY DEVELOPMENT TEAM (YAMDT) Traci Ruhland-Petty

The year since our last convention has been a time of transition. The Young Adult Ministry Development Team (YAMDT) has not formally met during the past year, and there is no longer a staff position of Young Adult Missioner. But, new Administrative Missioner Traci Ruhland-Petty is serving as staff liaison to and for young adults, and is a resource to anyone looking to connect or be involved.

Initiatives, conceived of and led by young adults, are developing across the diocese in a more organic fashion. From social justice and public policy involvement, to retreats and intentional fellowship time, we're connecting with each other across congregations and chapters, and becoming more involved as leaders and participants, as vestry members and as clergy. This transition time allows us an opportunity to reflect on what we've done, and discern what we'd like to do next. We're intentionally leaving space to brainstorm and try new things, supporting each other's ideas, passions, and leadership.

Are you looking to connect with other young adults in your area and/or across the diocese? What are you passionate about? What are you currently involved in or what would you like to be involved with (in your congregation, school/work, community) and do you need or would you like support in any of these areas? YOUTH MINISTRY DEVELOPMENT TEAM (YMDT) Jeff Cornforth, convener & Amy Mellies, Youth Missioner

The Youth Ministry Development Team (YMDT) continues living into its mission to resource, serve, support, and minister to the children, youth, and adult leaders in our diocese. The team is comprised of youth and adults from across the diocese who are dedicated to the spiritual and personal growth of young people in the Episcopal Church. Our ministry is directed by our intentional goals:

- to bring the youth of this diocese together to build community and develop Christian leadership
- to help young people claim their places in the church at all levels
- to equip and train the adults who work with young people in our diocese

Members of YMDT continue to participate in an annual weekend planning session/retreat. We have found this intentional time spent together in prayer, work, and fellowship has deepened our ministry and enhanced our programs. The annual retreat in 2019 was held February 2-4 at Christian Conference Center in Newton.

The following events were held over the last year:

• Diocesan Convention 2018: Youth Delegates to the 166th Diocesan Convention: Maire Powell of Church of the Saviour, Clermont, Alenah and Ayanna Rankin of St. Paul's, Council Bluffs were chosen to represent the voices of the youth of the diocese. Several other high school students joined the group of delegates as Youth Visitors to Convention. The tenth annual Youth Lock-in at the Cathedral (grades four through nine) took place in conjunction with Convention. Childcare and a children's program were both offered free of charge to children ages infant to grade three.

• Ski Trip: The annual ski trip was scheduled for January 18-20, 2019, but had to be rescheduled due to a snowstorm. The event took place February 8-10 at Camp Sacajawea in Boone, Iowa, with 83 youth and adult chaperones attending the weekend. Dale Schirmer of Grace, Cedar Rapids and Amy Mellies of St. John's, Ames coordinated the event. Participants enjoyed skiing and snowboarding at Seven Oaks in Boone. Moving to a more central location has allowed youth and adults from the western side of the Diocese to attend. In addition, Seven Oaks has snow tubing as a non-ski option, which invites more participation in the snowy fun.

• Happening: The Happening program has declined in the last couple of years. The last several years we have had two Happening events taking place each calendar year. Happening #46 was held March 8-10, 2019, at St. Luke's, Cedar Falls. Ursula Leksell of Church of the Good Shepherd, Webster City was rector for the weekend; Amy Mellies of St John's, Ames and Kristina Kofoot of St. Luke's, Cedar Falls served as Coordinators (adult leaders) and Jack Greve, as our musician. 23 youth and adults participated. Happening #47 was held at St Paul's, Council Bluffs August 31 – September 2, 2019. Co-rectors (youth leaders) were Annika Baker of St. Anne's, Ankeny and Grace Flemming of Christ Church, Cedar Rapids; Amy Mellies of St. John's, Ames and Abby Haggerty of St. Paul's, Council Bluffs as Coordinators (adult leaders). 25 youth and adults participated. Happening is

presented by high school youth for high school youth with the help of lay adult leadership and clergy. This is achieved through youth-led group activities, games, skits, singing, and worship. During the weekend, participants are invited to consider various aspects of their lives, God, their relationships with God in Christ, and their responses to God. One of the most distinctive characteristics of the Happening experience is the ongoing community of youth as part of the Happening team. The leadership development that takes place during Happening weekends encourages youth to claim their places in the church and community at large. Starting in the spring of 2020 we will only have one Happening per year.

• New Beginnings: Like Happening, New Beginnings is offered twice each year in order to enable as many youth as possible to attend and have opportunities for leadership roles in the church. New Beginnings #22 took place April 26-28, 2019 at St. Luke's, Cedar Falls, and was led by Shepherds (youth leaders) Nancy Ardon of St. Anne's, Ankeny and Cameron Wheeler of St. Timothy's, West Des Moines. Amy Mellies from St. John's Ames served as coordinator (adult leader) and Jack Greve as our musician. 28 youth and adults participated. New Beginnings #23 will be held October 11-13 at St. John's, Dubuque, and will be led by two Shepherds (youth leaders). Dale Schirmer of St John's, Mason City will serve as coordinator (adult leader). At the time of this report, registration had not yet closed and numbers are yet to be determined. New Beginnings is a junior high retreat designed to respond to the unique issues, concerns, and needs of teenagers. It is run by a team of motivated Christian youth dedicated to serving all on the weekend by living the gospel of Jesus Christ. It is also a chance for youth to reflect on the important relationships in their lives and consider making a "new beginning." In both Happening and New Beginnings, returning youth serving on staff are encouraged to live into a model of "servant leadership" that emphasizes a ministry of caring and support for those they serve.

• Summer Ministry School and Retreat: Children and youth of all ages participated in the annual Ministry School and Retreat June 14-16,2019 on the campus of Grinnell College in Grinnell. Youth who participated in the youth lock-in slept at St. Paul's Grinnell, playing games, learning about St. Paul's prairie, picking up trash in a nearby park and did crafts. Mike Wagner, Ali Turnquist, and Gailanne Dill coordinated the youth track. Nursery care was provided free of charge to parents and families attending the event.

• Summer Camp: EPIC was held July 29 – August 2, 2019 at Pictured Rocks UMC Camp in Monticello. Children and youth entering grades 4-12 attended. Campers enjoyed swimming, hiking, rock wall climbing, a talent show, arts and crafts, and much more. Kristina Kofoot of St Luke's, Cedar Falls served as camp director and was supported by four chaplains and a number of deans and counselors—all adult volunteers who very generously gave up a week of their summer to be with us. This year's theme was "Oh the Places You'll Go: Your Journey with Jesus." EPIC 2019 had 85 total campers and staff. The vast majority of campers are able to attend camp thanks to financial assistance from their parish and/or the diocese.

Youth Ministry in the Diocese of Iowa relies on many volunteers and donations. Thank you to the adults who spend their weekends sleeping on church floors and in camp bunk beds while chaperoning youth events. Thank you to all who provided transportation and donated food and funds. And thank you to the parents who support their children's participation in diocesan youth events. Youth Ministry is an important part of our life together as the Diocese of Iowa. As the YMDT plans the events for each year, great effort is made to make them accessible for as many of our young people as possible by seeking locations in different parts of the state. Not only does this make transportation to these events more manageable for parents and participants, but also allows many parishes to offer hospitality and support to our youth. There are differing requirements for accommodations, but we would welcome an invitation from any parish interested in hosting a future event. We are always in need of more volunteers as well. We welcome all who feel the call to work with the youth around the Diocese. Our youth are ready and willing to learn more about God, their faith and how they can contribute to their communities. 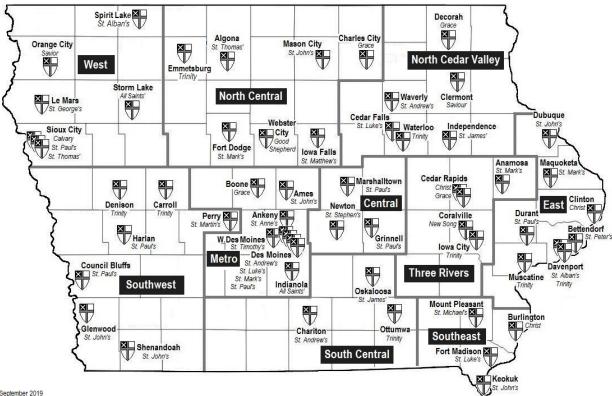

Central Chapter The Rev. Richard Graves, Chapter's Board Representative

The Central Chapter of the Episcopal Diocese of Iowa is made up of three congregations: St. Paul's, Grinnell, St. Stephen's, Newton, and St. Paul's, Marshalltown. We held two meetings in 2019 to promote fellowship, share best practices, provide input to the upcoming budget process, and to share the highlights of parish life with each other.

St. Stephen's, Newton, recently established a single 9:00 a.m. service on Sunday morning and this merger has received wide approval from the congregation. The church also has established a twice monthly "Breaking Bread" service on Saturday and a 2nd Wednesday service followed by a parish dinner and timely topic study.

The congregation has established a second "Blessing Box" that contains needed items at no charge to the community and has taken a major leadership role in the creation of the Newton-Peer Drop in Center in a repurposed building located across the street from the church.

The eight-session renewal program "Just Faith" will be offered at St. Stephen's, beginning on October 2. As past participants of this program, the congregation is eager to share this offering with the diocese, since it has brought so much new life to them.

St. Stephen's will host a Dismantling Racism Training on November 2, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

St. Paul's, Marshalltown, sustained significant damage in the July 2018 tornado and much of the energy of the congregation has gone toward repairing the church and property. Now that this process is nearly completed, the church looks forward to spending more of its time discerning how it can be of best use to God.

One of the mission goals of the church has been to reach out to our neighborhood, which is increasingly Hispanic in composition. Two Latino families are now worshipping actively on Sunday and assuming other ministry roles within the congregation.

The parish just renewed its contract with HEAD START and proudly hosts two classrooms of this educational outreach in its facility.

Other areas of outreach include Meals on Wheels, serving dinner at House of Compassion every other month, and promoting literacy through a Free Library.

St. Paul's, Grinnell, enjoys a lively parish atmosphere. They continue their long-established campus ministry at Grinnell College by providing a spiritual home to faculty, staff, and students and participating in a broad range of campus activities. Sunday mornings find the church mostly full and the sound of children can be heard before, during, and after the service.

St. Paul's began a Prairie Restoration Project on their property this year. It occupies a good bit of their front yard and students of Grinnell, through the Conrad Environmental Research Area (CERA), have been taking an active part in the project.

The Fourth Annual Divots for the Bishop Golf Tournament was held once again, which engaged three parishes and 19 participants and generated \$500 for GILEAD.

The multiple year renovation of the Kitchen and parish hall is now completed and plans are now underway to address action items related to the parish yard.

East Chapter The Rev. Elaine Caldbeck, Convener

St John's, Dubuque, serves a community meal on the fifth Sunday, and have a new choir director. Christ Church, Clinton, has book groups, garden/food outreach, and is connecting with the larger community especially on food during school breaks, community garage sale. Trinity, Muscatine, has made good progress with the search process, has concerts with local musicians and does laundry love. St Mark's, Makoqueta, has a fifth Sunday potluck, and supports the local food pantry and has grown in membership. Clinton and Bettendorf have switched to one Sunday service. St. John's, Dubuque needs a new musician, and Bettendorf and administrative assistant. Trinity Cathedral continues its outreach and many ministries and is deciding how to handle it's not currently usable rectory. St Peter's Bettendorf continues to have music concerts, and music lessons in its building. The three Quad Cities congregations worshipped together on fifth Sunday's last year and are switching to joint fifth Saturday evening worship.

As a chapter we approved a resolution to Convention on Human Trafficking and Slavery by Maggie Tinsman.

Metro Chapter The Rev. Vincent Bete, Chapter Board Representative

Metro Chapter congregations continue to focus on building relationships and improving communication.

The Chapter gatherings for Spring and Fall were held at St. John's By the Campus in Ames and at St. Mark's Church in Des Moines, respectively. The highlights of these gatherings include sharing of each parish programs, understanding the GILEAD Campaign, and conversations on finding opportunities for joint projects and fellowship activities.

The partnerships between/among congregations that started last year continue to develop. Joint activities continue in some of these congregations. It is through these partnerships that congregations implemented the Growing Iowa Leaders Day. Needless to say, the Cathedral Church of St. Paul remains to be a center of fellowship not only for the Metro Chapter but to the whole diocese.

This year also saw the beginning of the Clergy Coffee with Conversation that happens every first Tuesday of the month. This is an informal gathering for sharing and support.

North Cedar Valley Chapter Mr. Jeff Cornforth, Chapter Board Representative

The North Cedar Valley is alive and well. Even though many of our member churches are shrinking in size, the spirit is allowing the few of us, to do the work of many more. We are all trying to find different ways to be "church" while still maintaining our Episcopal identity. When we can all do this, we will see a different world.

A few events were held in the NCV over this past year. Engaging all Disciples has "engaged" most of our parishes, and we hope continued pleasure will comes with that giving of our treasures.

North Central Chapter

The North Central Chapter met in Webster City on April 25, 2019 and in Mason City on September 21, 2019.

South Central Chapter

The South Central Chapter met in Chariton on March 23, 2019 and in Oskaloosa on Aug. 31, 2019.

Southeast Chapter Susie Messer, Chapter Board Representative

We met twice this year, once in March and once in August. The general format for each meeting follows:

Prayer and scripture from the day

Name and congregation

Thoughts about chapters:

- What are important things happening around this chapter? What would you like to share from your place?
- Where have you/your congregation struggled this year?
- In what ways have you/has your congregation noticed and reached out to others not in your congregation?
- Thinking about the Diocese as a whole, what directions/ideas do you notice emerging, thinking especially about the Growing Iowa Leaders Days and Diocesan Convention?
- Reflecting on the conversation we just had, how might we capture some of the important sparks that would contribute to the growing light across the diocese?
- Representative from the Board of Directors offers information about GILEAD

March 3, 2019 Meeting - Christ Church, Burlington All Churches in the Chapter represented

At this meeting we also announced the information on the Summer Ministry and Retreat taking place in June. Ellen also explained the seven tracks along with the ongoing cohort opportunity that would start with the Retreat. All were encouraged to attend the retreat.

Engaging All Disciples: The Engaging All Disciples day will take place at St. John's in Keokuk Iowa March 23rd. St. John's will provide lunch for the attendees. Ideas at this meeting will be shared in terms of what the clusters can do to share and participate in activities together.

<u>Diocesan Budget for 2020:</u> Ellen presented thoughts on how the 2020 budget might be presented to the congregations throughout Iowa. Two Zoom meetings were announced for those that would like to discuss the future budget.

<u>Safeguarding God's People/Children</u> Discussion was about how all in a congregation would complete the online process on the Safeguarding website? It was a general consensus that some in our congregations do not have computers and if they do may not want to be involved with the process. We were encouraged to find out who the administrator in our individual congregation was and also exactly who needs to be trained.

<u>Small Church Quadrant Gatherings</u> The schedule for the meetings was listed. (St. Michael's was the only church from the Southeastern Chapter to attend the meeting on June 29 in Oskaloosa).

The following information represents other notes taken at the meeting:

• Check in – each congregation shared what is going well

St. Michael's, Mt. Pleasant – they now have a director of music. This came out of the Growing lowa Leader's Day. They are also using preprogramed music during communion and it seems to be working well. There have been quite a few people with major illnesses lately.

St. John's, Keokuk – they also have been experiencing some illnesses this winter. They are sharing a Lenten program with a Lutheran church in town as well as St. Paul's in Nauvoo.

St. Luke's, Ft. Madison – have remodeled the bathroom closest to the sanctuary. It is now handicapped accessible. They will be sharing Lenten luncheons with Parish Partners in Ft. Madison and helping with the Early Easter Sunrise service at the Old Fort. They also have a new sign for the front of the building which will be hung when weather improves a bit.

Christ Church, Burlington – redid the flooring in the parish hall and kitchen. Have begun taking their turn at helping with the new food pantry in the Roman Catholic Church. This is a new pantry in Burlington. The box gardens are anxiously awaiting spring so people can start the planting. Christ Church hosts several community groups in their church. An interest seems to be growing to establish an Order of St. Luke's, and we'll see how this emerges.

• Board rep, Susie Messer gave a report on the Board of Directors meeting held in Jan. Discussion around the report from Meg Wagner about her trip exploring Fresh Expressions. Board reviewed the "gift" policy and has tabled it for more information. The church in Denison has been sold and the congregation in Waverly is renting out space in their building. We talked about contacting the Diocese for resources on how best to handle the renting situations.

• Commended Michelle Moore on her medical missionary work and talked about her willingness to share the story with others who might like to get involved.

• Susie Messer also reported on GILEAD and what it means to be a collaborating congregation. Several mentioned they had received the flyer explaining GILEAD.

• Conversation about EAD day on Mar. 23. Question about accepting dietary restrictions on the registration form. Keokuk is setting up the caterer and the diocese will pay. There was a question about the commissioning service on the EAD day. Can we include the Licensed Ministries people?

• Next meetings: August 18, 2019 at Ft. Madison at 2:00pm and March 15, 2020 at Mt. Pleasant at 2:00pm

<u>August 18, 2029 Meeting at St. Luke's Ft. Madison</u> Members from St. Luke's, Christ Church, and St. Michael's were in attendance. Ellen Bruckner represented the Diocese at our meeting.

This meeting took a different format with a Michelle Moore and Amy Hayes presenting the topic of preparing for the end of life. The morning presentation ended with a movie titled "New Rules for the End of Life." The movie was incredible and was highly recommended to be shown throughout our congregations. In fact, all in attendance thought the presentation would be a good topic for a future convention presentation. Along with the presentation, materials were distributed covering topics of "Five Wishes," "Iowa Physician Orders for Scope of Treatment (IPOST) and "Welcomed to Medicare and Annual Wellness Visits".

We also covered the following topics: Living will; Durable (Medical) Power of Attorney; General Power of Attorney; Informed Treatment Decisions; Personal Readiness; Stages of dying; Belief System, Cultural and Religious.

This presentation took place from 9 to 12 with our chapter meeting immediately following.

<u>Chapter Meeting</u>

We "zoomed" with Anne Wagner, Diocesan Comptroller, who presented the 2020 proposed budget. Anne read a letter from the Bishop. A few questions were asked followed by a short discussion of the budget.

The next Three Rivers Chapter meeting, scheduled for Sunday, August 25, will focus on our chapter preparation for the fall festival as well as preparing for the diocesan convention in addition to other items of business as requested by Bishop Alan and member congregations of the chapter.

Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 2018 and 2017

1. Nature of Business and Organization

The Episcopal Diocese of Iowa (the Diocese) was incorporated under the laws of the State of Iowa for the purpose of accounting for all funds received through church pledges, gifts, and bequests. Funds are disbursed in the many program areas of the Church upon receiving vouchers from the many individual boards, committees, commissions, or agencies which have been authorized to act on behalf of the Diocese of Iowa. The Diocese also accounts for all property purchased, donated, or sold on behalf of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Iowa.

As part of its operations, the Diocese periodically makes unsecured loans to congregations which are a part of the Diocese of Iowa. Payments on the loans are to be made from the operating budgets of these organizations in accordance with an agreed upon payment schedule.

The operations of the Diocese are carried out primarily by volunteers throughout the Diocese of Iowa as well as the Diocesan office (i.e., the Bishop and his staff) which is organized to facilitate the overall program development and administration of the Diocese.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Recently Issued Accounting Pronouncements

In May 2014, FASB issued ASU 2014-09, Revenue from Contracts with Customers. ASU 2014-09 supersedes the revenue recognition requirements in Revenue Recognition (Topic 605) and requires entities to recognize revenue in a way that depicts the transfer of promised goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled to in exchange for those goods or services. ASU 2014-09 is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 31, 2018. Management is currently evaluating the potential impact that the adoption of this new accounting guidance will have on its financial statements.

Recently Adopted Accounting Pronouncements

During the year ended December 31, 2018, Episcopal Diocese of Iowa adopted ASU 2016-14, *Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities.* The amendments in this ASU made improvements to the information provided in financial statements and accompanying notes. The amendments set forth the FASB's improvements to net asset classification requirements and the information presented about the Organization's liquidity, financial performance, and cash flows.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, for purposes of reporting on the Statements of Cash Flows, consists of checking and savings accounts used for general operations.

Receivables

The Diocese records as receivable only those unpaid amounts, which are believed to be collectible. Therefore, no allowance for doubtful accounts has been provided for in the financial statements. No finance charges are applied to past due accounts. Accounts receivable over ninety days old as of December 31, 2018 and 2017 were \$2,836 and \$830, respectively.

Investments and Security Valuation

Investments include those that belong to the Diocese as well as those held by the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund on behalf of others. All investments in securities are recorded at their estimated fair value as described in Note 6.

Funds Held for the Benefit of Others - Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund

The Board of Directors of the Diocese acts as trustee of the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund, a common investment fund available to congregations and other organizations of the Diocese of Iowa. The Foundation Fund invests primarily in marketable equity and debt securities which are carried at fair market value.

In the ordinary course of business, the Diocese through the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund, acts as a custodian for funds owned by others and for which no benefit of income or principal is received. In these cases, the balances are treated as liabilities, rather than included in the Diocese's net assets, and as assets held in investment accounts. The income derived from these investments is not included on the Statements of Activities but reflected as a change in the value of related assets and liabilities.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The Diocese records financial assets and liabilities using a fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value into three broad levels as follows:

Level 1 – Quoted prices (unadjusted) are available in active markets for identical assets or liabilities as of the reporting date.

Level 2 – Pricing inputs are quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets or inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly through market corroboration, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument.

Level 3 – Significant inputs to pricing have little or no observability as of the reporting date. The types of assets or liabilities included in Level 3 are those with inputs requiring significant management judgment or estimation, such as complex and subjective models and forecasts used to determine fair value.

As required by FASB ASC 820-10, financial assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Diocese's assessment of significance of a specific input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

The following valuation techniques were used by the Diocese in estimating the fair values of financial instruments:

Mutual Funds – The fair values of mutual funds are based on quoted market prices of the shares owned by the Diocese.

Cash and cash equivalents and short-term investments – amounts reported for these instruments are historical cost which approximates their fair value.

lowa Diocesan Foundation Fund – consists of mutual funds, common trust funds, and exchange traded funds representing debt and equity securities that generally are not publicly traded and primarily are valued based upon net asset value. The Fund is divided into participating units which are valued as of the monthly valuation dates set by the Foundation, which is generally the last day of each month.

Contribution Receivable – Remainder Trust – Trust assets are measured using present value of cash flows discounted at a 6% rate for 22 years as of December 31, 2018 (6% for 23 years in 2017).

Beneficial Interest in Perpetual Trusts:

Artemus Bush – Helen Jones Trust – consists of publicly traded debt and equity securities, of which the Corporation has a 20% interest in its investment income. The Diocese's interest in this trust recorded at 20% of its fair market value.

Paul Beer Trust – Trust assets are measured using present value of the annual amount received discounted at a 6% rate for 40 years.

Retiree Health Insurance Payable – liability is measured using present value of the premiums expected to be paid based on retiree life expectancy calculated using the mortality table published by the Office of the Actuary of the Social Security Administration, discounted at 3%. Eligible individuals under age 68 are discounted an additional 10% for each year under 68. During 2010, the Board of Directors elected to terminate the retiree health insurance program effective December 31, 2020.

Property, Plant, and Equipment

Property, plant, and equipment are stated at cost of acquisition. All land and buildings owned by the Diocese of Iowa are recorded as real estate at their historical cost or fair market value, in the case of gifts. Proceeds from the sale of land and buildings may retained by the Diocese or passed through to the church. The use of the sales proceeds is determined by the Board on a case-by-case basis.

Depreciation of plant and equipment is recorded over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets using the straight-line method.

Expenditures for major repairs or replacements are capitalized and expenditures for repairs and minor replacements are charged to expense.

Long-Lived Assets

Long-lived assets to be held and used are tested for recoverability whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying amount of the assets may not be recoverable. When required, impairment losses on assets are recognized based upon the fair value of the asset.

Restricted Assets

The Organization reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: those without donor restrictions and those with donor restrictions. The Organization records contributions received depending on the existence of any donor restrictions. When a donor purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the Statement of Activities as net assets released from restrictions. Income from the restricted net asset funds is classified consistent with such restrictions. Donor restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same fiscal year as received are reported as additions to unrestricted net assets.

Revenue Recognition

Contributions are recognized when a donor makes a promise to give to the Diocese that is, in substance, unconditional. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions expire in the year the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions which may be purpose, time, or perpetual in nature. Perpetually restricted net assets represent net assets to be held indefinitely, the income of which is expendable.

Income Taxes

The Diocese is organized exclusively for religious purposes and is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications to the 2017 financial statements have been made to conform to the 2018 presentation.

3. Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Diocese to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of demand deposits located at one financial institution. Frequently, the balances of these cash deposits have exceeded the federally insured limit of \$250,000. The Diocese had \$272,677 and \$223 deposited in excess of the insured limits at December 31, 2018 and 2017.

4. Notes Receivable

The Diocese maintains a revolving loan fund which enables congregations to borrow funds to meet various needs. The fund contains approximately 6 loans with balances ranging from \$754 to \$79,169 at December 31, 2018. Interest rates vary from 1.25% to 5.50% per annum with maturities generally being 10 years or less.

5. Conditional Grant

On April 17, 2003, the Diocese entered into an agreement with the Bishop of Iowa granting \$80,000 for the down payment on a home. The grant is amortizable over 25 years and is factored into the Bishop's annual compensation. In the event the home is sold or destroyed by fire or other natural disaster, the remaining unamortized balance is due and payable from any applicable proceeds. As of December 31, 2018 and 2017, the unamortized balance of the grant was \$30,045 and \$33,245, respectively.

6. Remainder and Perpetual Trusts

The Diocese is beneficiary of three trusts. Each trust is valued at the Diocese's share of the underlying investments. All trusts consist of marketable securities and are perpetually restricted net assets. At December 31, 2018, the remainder trust valued at \$13,668 was discounted at 6% over 22 years, the life expectancy of the primary beneficiaries.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions – The Episcopal has received donations and bequests, which under terms of their receipt are to be used for specific purposes and are classified net assets with donor restrictions. The exchange reserves serve as clearing accounts for receipts designated by the source, either inside or outside of the Diocesan structure, for transmittal outside the Diocese. Special purpose funds were established to account for contributions restricted by an outside source for special purpose expenditures and are administered by the Bishop and/or the Board of Directors. Net assets with restrictions perpetual in nature are contributions received by the Diocese to generate income for transferal to other funds. These funds are administered by the Diocese in accordance with the terms specified by the donor at the time of the gift or bequest.

Episcopal Diocese of lowa receives substantial support from restricted contributions. Because a donor's restriction requires resources to be used in a particular manner or in a future period, sufficient resources must be maintained to meet those responsibilities to its donors. As a result, financial assets may not be available for general expenditure within one year. As part of Episcopal Diocese of Iowa's liquidity management it follows the policy of structuring its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures, liabilities, and other obligations come due. To help manage unanticipated liquidity needs, the Board has established designated reserves which may be drawn, upon Board approval, in the event of an immediate liquidity need.

11. **Retirement Compensation Plans**

In order to provide retirement benefits to the full-time employees of the Diocesan office, the Episcopal Diocese of Iowa participates in a multi-employer pension plan. The plan provides benefits to substantially all employees in the Diocese. The pension expense for the year ended December 31, 2018 was \$70,533 (\$72,334 in 2017).

12. Medical and Life Insurance for Retired Clergy

It is the policy of the Convention of the Diocese of Iowa to maintain medical and life insurance coverage up to certain limits for the lifetime of all retired and disabled Diocesan clergy who meet certain required criteria. Medical and life insurance premiums paid for retired clergy for the year ended December 31, 2018, was \$11,411 (\$9,055 in 2017).

13. **Operating Leases**

The Diocese leases various office equipment expiring at various times through 2021. Rent expense for the years ending December 31, 2018 and 2017, totaled \$7,533 and \$8,955, respectively.

14. Endowment Funds

The Diocese's endowment funds consist of net assets without donor restrictions (undesignated and designated reserves) and net assets with donor restrictions (subject to purpose restrictions available for projects and perpetual in nature which provide that the principal be invested for perpetuity with only the income available for use). As required by generally accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The Board of Directors of the Diocese has not fully reviewed and interpreted the provisions of Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act, which was adopted as law in the State of Iowa during 2008. At the present time, the Diocese has adopted the practice of preserving the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the perpetually restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result, the Diocese classifies as perpetually restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) the change in estimated value of third party trusts held for the benefit of, but not managed by, the Diocese. Use of the investment income from the assets under Diocese control may be unrestricted and used as the Diocese deems necessary for the purposes for which the original restricted gift was received. Currently, the Diocese considers the following factors in determining whether to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- The duration and preservation of the fund
- The purposes of the Diocese and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- General economic conditions
- The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- · The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- Other resources of the Diocese
- The investment policies of the Diocese

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with donor-restricted funds (excluding trust funds) may fall below the level that the donor requires the Diocese to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, deficiencies of this nature that are reported in unrestricted net assets were \$0 and \$0 at December 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively.

Beloved sisters and brothers in Christ,

It seems appropriate to anticipate 2020 as a year for perfect vision; and to grasp a clearer sight as to God's mission for us, and especially for us among our neighbors for the sake of God's love. It is an especially good year to look back and see more clearly, in hindsight, the way God has been directing us. That is one way of expressing this year's Convention theme of "Finding the Simple Way," which will ultimately consider the attached draft budget for 2020.

I am excited to outline some of what we can expect in the coming year. It is a year with four major points of mission interest at the Diocesan level. We will focus on small church vitality and gather an International Summit on the subject. Engaging All Disciples continues in 2020 through the ongoing coaching in ministry cohorts, and we maintain our emphasis on encouraging young adults in leadership and mission through hosting the Iowa stage of the Tri-Companion Pilgrimage for Young Adults in the fall. We will also launch, at Convention, details about a team training process for congregational development called Faithful Innovations, aimed at impacting medium size and larger congregations. 2020 will also be the first of many years in which grants from your generous donations to the Diocesan Campaign, GILEAD, will begin to roll out in response to your creative ministry and mission ideas.

Over all, the diocesan budget provides for the infrastructure of mission and ministry of the Diocese: the Episcopacy, Young Adults, Youth and Children, Congregational Transition and Life, Congregational Ministry Formation and Development, Administrative and Financial support. Stability at this regular level through your congregational participation in the common Stewardship Share helps us to be able to launch out and be bold and inspired in these new mission endeavors.

You will notice some additions to this year's budget from last year. These reflect the administration assistance required for the smooth administrating of GILEAD grants, as well as the receiving, acknowledging and tracking of GILEAD contributions. There is also a new item in the diocesan budget in assuming a portion of support for The Beloved Community Initiative, which up to now has been launched solely on grants provided by The Episcopal Church Genesis project.

It is an honor to present this budget for your consideration. It is our collective statement of commitment to God's work with us along the Way of Love. I believe that this is a year to celebrate how clearly God has been guiding and inspiring us these past few years, and to catch a more perfect vision of what can be done in God's precious Name. You are a generous, loving people for whom I give God thanks, and with whom it is a special privilege to serve.

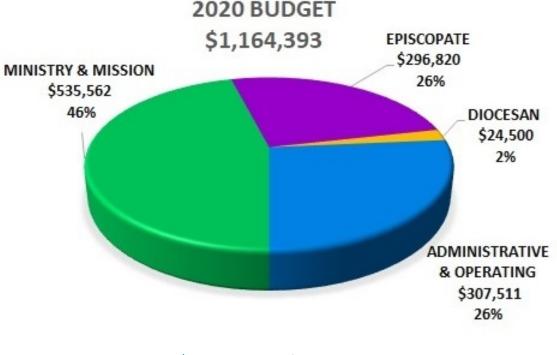
The Diocesan Budget is a statement of our hopes and plans for the coming year for our common ministry as the Episcopal Diocese of Iowa, "in mission with Christ through each and all."

After considering input from Chapter meetings and reviewing the earlier draft budget, the Ways & Means Committee and the Board of Directors are presenting this proposed budget to delegates for approval at Diocesan Convention in October.

Changes from the previous draft budget include adjustments to health insurance costs from the estimated 6% increase to 5.8%, a slight increase in staff salaries to 1.2%, an adjustment to employer payroll tax, and a few additional tweaks to create a balanced budget.

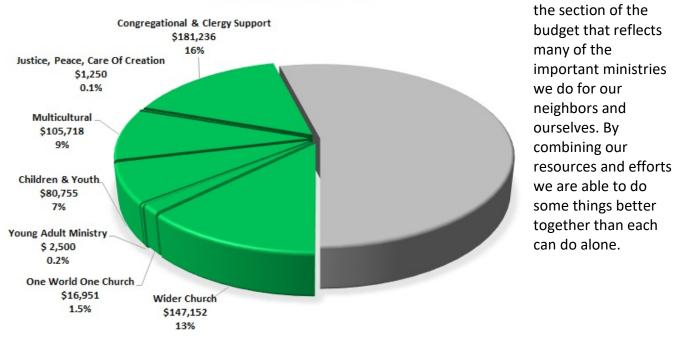


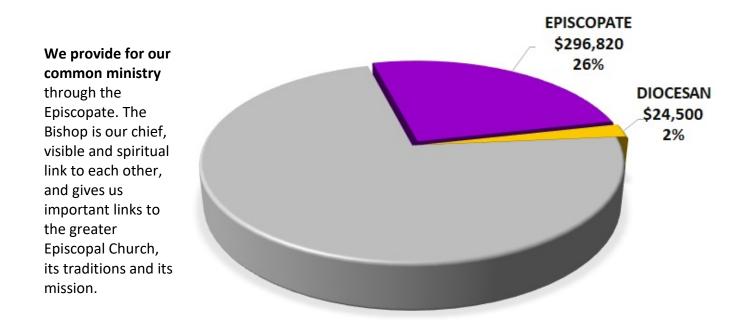
Diocesan Budget Process

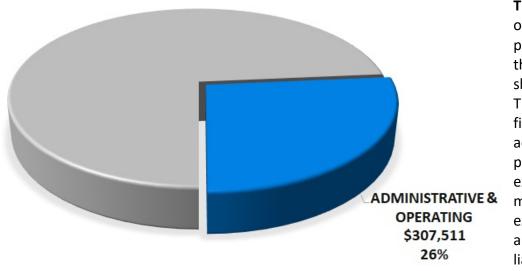

The Diocesan section of the budget provides for those things we must do as a Diocese. We must hold an annual convention and have Diocesan governing boards, commissions and committees that provide oversight and organization for our work together.

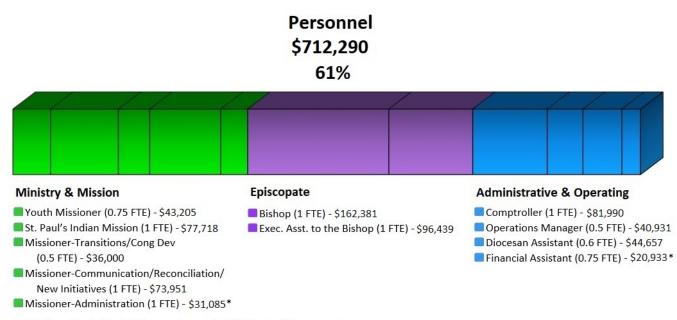

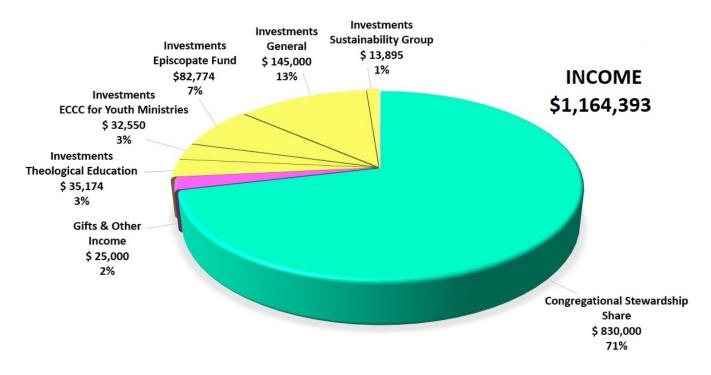
The final section of the operating budget provides the grease that makes much of our shared work possible. These expenses include financial and administrative personnel; office expenses; utilities and maintenance; the expense of an annual audit; and property and liability insurance.

Salaries and benefits for Diocesan personnel are listed in the sections of the budget that most closely relate to their job. This budget has a 1.2% cost of living increase for all salaries, except for the Bishop's, whose salary is increased 5% to bring it closer in line with similar dioceses. The 2020 health insurance rates are an average 5.8% increase over 2019.

Personnel changes reflected in this budget include the Missioner for Transitions & Congregational Development, the Missioner for Administration, and the Financial Assistant. Since GILEAD is a large part of descriptions for both the Missioner for Administration and the Financial Assistant, 50% of these two positions will be funded in the budget, and 50% will be funded from GILEAD.

The greatest portion of income is Stewardship Share support received from congregations (71%), followed by income from diocesan investments (27%). Gifts and other undesignated income make up the remaining 2% of this budget. Income from investments is drawn at 5%, with the exception of the Sustainability Group, which is a 2% draw.

A new <u>Diocesan Funding Policy and Stewardship Share Formula</u> effective for 2020 has been adopted by the Ways & Means Committee and approved by the Board of Directors. The annual Stewardship Share of each congregation shall be determined by the following formula:

- 1. Determine the Base Amount that is the lesser of either the previous year operating income, or the average of operating income of the previous three years, as reported in the annual parochial reports.
- 2. A deduction of \$35,000 is allowed for congregations supporting a full-time cleric. This deduction will be pro-rated for congregations that support a cleric less than full-time, with a minimum deduction of \$3,000 for congregations without stipendiary clergy.
- 3. The Stewardship Share shall be the Base Amount less the clergy deduction, multiplied by the applicable percent from the following table:

Base Amount	<u>Percent</u>
\$0-\$50,000	11%
\$50,000-\$100,000	13%
\$100,000-\$200,000	15%
\$200,000 & above	17%

Congregations making a commitment less than the full Stewardship Share shall make a written appeal to the Ways & Means Committee for a reduction in their Stewardship Share. The appeal should include an explanation and financial reports, and sent by mail to Ways & Means Committee, 225 37th Street,

Des Moines, IA 50312, or by email to diocese@iowaepiscopal.org. The Ways & Means Committee may request to meet with representatives of the congregations in considering the appeal.

Congregations that do not agree to their Stewardship Share, even after appeal, may not be eligible for grants, loans, or other special funding through the Diocese of Iowa.

Ways & Means will review this formula at least every three years.

Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund:

Description

The lowa Diocesan Foundation Fund was established in 1959 and offers a convenient, professionally managed investment fund for the congregations of the Diocese of Iowa, and most of the special purpose funds given to the Diocese. By creating a common pool of investable funds, participants are able to invest in a well-diversified portfolio.

The Investment Policy of the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund establishes the investment policies and objectives of the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund to assist the Investment Committee and Board of Directors of the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa and the Investment Consultant in effectively supervising, monitoring and evaluating investments (http://iowaepiscopal.org/investment-policy.html).

State Street Global Advisors, as part of the Endowment Management Solutions Program of the Episcopal Church Foundation, was retained in 2015 for asset management of the Foundation Fund, at the direction of the Board of Directors of the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa. Trustee fees are based on the market value of all investments in the trust at the end of each quarter.

The Foundation Fund is divided into participating units, thus providing a means of preserving the identity of each participating organization. Participating shares in the Foundation are acquired in direct proportion to the size of each fund or gift.

Valuation dates are fixed by the Foundation as the last day of each month, and distributions of 5%, based on a rolling three-year average of the portfolio balance, less operating and management expenses, are made to participating organizations. This distribution is made monthly, and participants may reinvest their earnings if they chose to do so. Units may be issued or withdrawn on the first day of each month, provided that such request to make investment or withdrawal has been received by check or in writing at the office of the Diocese of Iowa prior to the valuation date on which investment or withdrawal is to take place.

Performance Reports and Audited financial statements are available for review at the Diocesan Office.

Report on the Financial Statements

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Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 2018 and 2017

1. Nature of Organization

The Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund is a common investment fund available to all parishes, missions, and other organizations of the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa. State Street Global Advisors of Boston, Massachusetts, holds the Foundation Fund's investment assets in trust and executes transactions therein at the direction of the Board of Directors of the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa. Trustee fees are based on the market value of all investments in the trust at the end of each quarter.

The Fund is divided into participating units which are valued as of the monthly valuation dates set by the Foundation, which is generally the last day of each month. Units may be issued or withdrawn on the first day of each month. Monthly distributions of 5%, based on a rolling three-year average of the portfolio balance, less operating and management expenses, are made to participating organizations. The accounting records of the Fund are maintained on the accrual basis.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Cash

For the purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents are comprised of cash on hand, savings, and checking accounts.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Security Valuation

All investments in securities are recorded at their estimated fair value as described in Note 3.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The Foundation records financial assets and liabilities using a fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value into three broad levels as follows:

Level 1 – Quoted prices (unadjusted) are available in active markets for identical assets or liabilities as of the reporting date.

Level 2 – Pricing inputs are quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets or inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly through market corroboration, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument.

Level 3 – Significant inputs to pricing have little or no observability as of the reporting date. The types of assets or liabilities included in Level 3 are those with inputs requiring significant management judgment or estimation, such as complex and subjective models and forecasts used to determine fair value.

As required by FASB ASC 820-10, financial assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Foundation's assessment of the significance of a specific input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

The following methods and assumptions were used by the Foundation in estimating the fair value of its financial instruments.

Investments in marketable securities, including certain mutual funds, and cash equivalents are measured at fair value based on quoted prices in active markets and as such are categorized as Level 1.

Investments in certain mutual funds are measured at fair value based on the underlying unit value reported at net asset value, which is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the funds less their liabilities.

The carrying amounts of cash, receivables, accounts payable, accrued expenses, and other liabilities approximate their fair values due to the short-term maturities of these financial instruments.

Other

The Foundation records security transactions based on a trade date. Dividend income is recognized on the ex-dividend date and interest income is recognized on an accrual basis. Discounts and premiums on securities purchased are accreted and amortized over the lives of the respective securities. Withholding taxes on foreign dividends have been provided for in accordance with the Foundation's understanding of the applicable country's tax rules and rates.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications to the 2017 financial statements have been made to conform to the 2018 presentation.

3. Fair Value Measurements

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2018 and 2017.

Cash/Money Market Funds

The fair value of the cash or money market funds is generally based on quoted prices in active markets.

Common Trust Funds and Exchange Traded Funds

The fair value of the Common Trust Funds and Exchange Traded Funds is based on the underlying unit value reported at the net asset values (NAV). The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the funds less their liabilities. These accounts consist of portfolios of assets as follows:

Large Cap Equities – This asset class is generally comprised of investments in approximately 500 leading companies in leading industries in the U.S. market with approximately 75% coverage of the U.S. Stock market capitalization. Stocks typically carry more risk than fixed income investment options but have the potential for higher returns over longer time periods. All investment options in this category have the potential to lose value.

Small/Mid Cap Equities – This asset class is generally comprised of investments in approximately 400 U.S. mid-cap securities as well as the Russell 2000 Index. Small/Mid Cap stocks typically carry more risk than larger U.S. equity investments but have the potential for higher returns. All investment options in this category have the potential to lose value.

International Equities – This asset class is generally comprised of investments in stocks or shares of ownership in companies with their principal place of business or office outside the United States. International investments often carry more risk that U.S. equity investments but may have the potential for higher returns. All investment options in this category have the potential to lose value.

REITs – This asset class is generally comprised of investment funds that seek a return that approximates the Dow Jones U.S. Select REIT Index and the SPDR Dow Jones International Real Estate ETF. These funds are managed using a "passive" or "indexing" approach which attempts to replicate the performance of those previously mentioned indexes. These investments include real estate holdings, both domestic and international and as such often carry significant risk. All investment options in this category have the potential to lose value.

Fixed Income - This asset class is generally comprised of various types of fixed income investments, typically bonds or U.S. Treasury securities. Although typically lower in risk than investment options that invest solely in equities, all investment options in this category have the potential to lose value.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Foundation believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

The Foundation's assets which are measured at fair value on a recurring basis as of December 31, 2018 and 2017 are presented below based on the fair value hierarchy levels:

The Foundation's investment funds may participate in an agency securities lending program sponsored by State Street Bank and Trust Company for the purpose of lending securities and investing the collateral in a collateral reinvestment fund. None of the collateral pools are FDIC insured bank deposits or otherwise guaranteed. Investors may lose money by participating in the lending program and through investments in the collateral pool.

4. Investments

Investments are presented in the financial statements at their aggregate market values. The change in the difference between the market value and the cost of investments is reflected in the statements as the change in unrealized gain or loss on investments. All investments are held for trading purposes.

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6. Principal Risks

The Foundation in the normal course of business makes investments in financial instruments and derivatives where the risk of potential loss exists due to changes in the market (market risk), or failure or inability of the counterparty to a transaction to perform (credit and counterparty risk). See below for a detailed description of how the Foundation's investment advisor State Street Global Advisors (SSgA) manages the principal risks.

Risk Management

Risk is monitored and managed in several ways at SSgA. First, SSgA has an independent risk team that reviews the portfolio and provides reporting on the contribution to risk of the various exposures in the portfolio. Second, the process involves several asset class committee meetings, portfolio management meetings, and a "politics and policy" team meeting that ultimately culminates in a final "alpha meeting" where the quantitative and qualitative aspects of SSgA's investment approach are synthesized into final investment decisions. This process also plays an important role in risk management.

Exposure Analytics - Compliance with Risk Guidelines

Asset class exposures are bounded by each client's customized investment objectives and constraints. SSgA codifies these limits and benchmarks into its trading/rebalancing system. Within this system, systematic pre- and post-trade tolerance checks are run to verify compliance with portfolio guidelines and policy targets or bands. Active decisions are made by overweighting attractive asset classes and underweighting less attractive ones, relative to benchmark. Maximum exposures from a benchmark are dependent upon the desired level of aggressiveness in a mandate definition.

Operational Risk Management

SSgA manages for risk at several levels. At the investment-team level, the portfolio managers conduct ongoing reviews of the portfolios they manage. Every portfolio has risk management guidelines accompanied by appropriate escalation procedures should the portfolios move outside of various constraints (i.e., sector). Other tasks specific to their risk-management process include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Understanding thoroughly investment guidelines/restrictions with regard to client agreements/fund mandates and managing portfolios in accordance with those mandates.
- Following SSgA Investment Policies articulated by the investment team's respective global asset class Chief Investment Officer.
- Constructing portfolios with risk characteristics consistent to their investment strategies and parameters.
- Complying with the SSgA Code of Ethics, which governs personal trading activity.

SSGA's Investment Risk Management Team provides additional portfolio oversight. The Investment Risk Management Team is composed of risk managers globally, most of whom have advanced degrees in quantitative methods, economics, and finance.

The Investment Risk Management Team's role is one of both control and support. Control in that they seek to confirm that risks are in line with client/management tolerances. Support in that they determine whether portfolio managers are taking risks where they have the greatest expertise. They work both to ensure that risk contributions are consistent with return expectations and to highlight intentional and unintentional exposures. The Investment Risk Management Team also monitors portfolio risk exposures to ensure they are consistent with client guidelines and with the intended alpha generation targets. Attention is focused on where SSgA has risk, how much risk it has, and whether the risk exposures are consistent with its views and client objectives. Risk exposure is monitored in relation to the client's Investment Management Agreement.

The Investment Risk Management Team works closely with the portfolio managers and Information Technology Team to identify, calculate, and produce portfolio-level analytics for SSgA's equity, currency, cash, and fixed-income portfolios. The underlying analytics system integrates risk monitoring, risk measurement, and risk management into the investment process.

Finally, risk profiles of lead equity, currency, investment solutions, cash, and fixed income strategies are reviewed monthly by the Investment Committee.

7. Investment Advisory Fees

The Foundation receives investment management and advisory services under agreements with SSgA and the Episcopal Church Foundation. The Foundation incurred fees totaling \$71,961 during the year ended December 31, 2018 (\$74,371 in 2017). During the year ended December 31, 2018 \$19,297 (\$19,262 in 2017) of the total fees were paid to the Episcopal Church Foundation, an affiliate of the Foundation.

8. Related Party Transactions

The Convention of the Diocese of Iowa elects and provides guidance to the Board of Directors of the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa, which in turn, functions as the trustee to the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund.

The Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa (the Corporation) owned 83,813 and 85,438 participating units in the Fund at December 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively. The Corporation's total equity in the Fund at December 31, 2018 and 2017 was \$5,891,171 and \$6,906,927 respectively.

At December 31, 2018, the Iowa Diocesan Foundation Fund owed the Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Iowa \$78,229 (\$71,841 in 2017).

9. Income Taxes

The Foundation is organized exclusively for religious purposes and is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

11. Subsequent Events

The Organization has evaluated events and transactions occurring after December 31, 2018 for potential items required to be recognized or disclosed in the financial statements. Subsequent events were evaluated through June 14, 2019, the date the financial statements were available for issuance.

Chaplains to the Retired Clergy The Rt. Rev. Alan Scarfe

The establishment of the Chaplains to the Retired network came out of the Church Pension Group and recognized by General Convention in 2006. Liane Nichols and Bill Moorhead have served over the past year as appointed chaplains to the retired clergy of the Diocese of Iowa. In this ministry, chaplains function partly on their own initiative following up on retired clergy but also as directed in my own pastoral references. We are very grateful for the ministry contributions of all who have served as chaplains, and welcome conversation with those who feel called to this particular pastoral service.

Commission on Church Property, Architecture and Allied Arts Ms. Anne Wagner, Comptroller

This Commission serves as an advisory group on questions of church property, financing, safety, building use by outside groups, and risk management of church property. They also are responsible for oversight of the Diocesan House, closed church properties, property and liability insurance, and to review and approve Revolving Fund Loans applications that meet the criteria of the Revolving Fund Loan Policy.

During 2019 this group helped facilitate the sale of the closed church property in Red Oak; consulted with and is assisting Trinity Church in Denison on the sale of their rectory and church building.

Commission on Ministry (COM) The Rev. Anne Moats Williams, Chair

The work of the Commission is outlined in the Ministry Canons of the national church as serving as an advisory group appointed by the Bishop. The Commission of Ministry (COM) met five (5) times since the last diocesan convention. We gave thanks to Spivey Knapik for service as a member of the Commission. The Commission is currently working with eight postulants seeking ordination to the priesthood, four postulants seeking ordination to the vocational diaconate, five candidates for ordination to the priesthood, and one Ministry Development Team. During the past year, Bishop Scarfe has ordained three to the priesthood.

The Commission is thankful for the work of The Rev. Canon Kathleen Milligan, our diocesan examining chaplain, Ellen Bruckner, Ex-Officio, Julianne Allaway, and the Diocesan office staff for their assistance in the work done on behalf of the Commission and in support of the formation process for ordination.

Council on Deacons Deacons Judith Crossett and Jeanie Smith

At Bishop Scarfe's request, and with the results of a survey on deacon formation showing that deacons value time with other deacons, we have revived the Deacons' Council. It's still a work in progress.

We have met three times: In person on June 1, 2019 for a Deacons' Day with the Bishop at St. Paul's in Des Moines; and twice by Zoom.

Our meeting at St. Paul's Cathedral included a mutual check-in: what in our diaconal ministry would we like other deacons to pray for? We discussed meeting frequency, the role of deacons in the diocese, the name and nature of the group. The original Council was (I believe) a smaller leadership group; we are a gathering of all the deacons, so we may need a new name. The day closed with Eucharist; we had the joy of giving the dismissal as a gathering of deacons, in unison.

The two Zoom meetings have been spent discussing Shane Claiborne's <u>book Irresistible Revolution</u> and planning for diocesan convention. At the Bishop's request, discussion following Shane Claiborne's talk at Convention will be led by deacons, who have formulated the questions for Indaba-style discussion in small table groups.

The vision for the Deacons' Gathering is evolving. The purposes we see now are as follows:

- Mutual support, prayer, sharing of concerns (and griefs); a safe place
- Regular contact from convener/leader of group to each, but especially to those no longer active
- Find what needs for ongoing education we have and ways to supply them
- Mentoring of deacons in formation and newly ordained
- Coordinate diaconal service to the diocese

All these will get modified by the group, because we should be attuned to ourselves and our needs, and meeting them. The rest of our work is for the world; the gathering is for us.

Priests in New/Transitional Situations (PINTS) The Rev. Steve Godfrey, convener

We continue to support recently ordained priests and priests and pastors leading congregations in transition, including during the first two years of a new settled ministry, through Priests and Pastors in New/Transitional Situations (PINTS). PINTS meets about five times per year, for half a day, sharing a meal and conversation with the bishop and one another about how things are going and particular challenges, addressing critical incidents in structured small group reflection, and learning together about areas of particular concern to pastors in new and transitional calls. This effort follows in the footsteps of former "Fresh Start" and interim priest gatherings. We strive to address intentionally some areas where clergy who are newly ordained or new to the diocese may need instruction or orientation, like administration, youth ministry, pastoral offices, and liturgical planning. Clergy appreciate the opportunity to form and deepen collegial relationships that can help sustain ministry for years into the future. PINTS currently includes 20 priests and is convened by the Rev. Steve Godfrey.

Professional Development Leaves The Rt. Rev. Alan Scarfe

Professional Development Leaves are for the purpose of encouraging professional growth and an increased competence of the clergy and lay professionals, which will contribute to the life and work of the Church in the Diocese of Iowa. Leaves may be granted for regular study at any academic level in a college, university or seminary, for research in a specific area of the Church's life, or for other creative work, which will benefit the Church in the Diocese of Iowa.

In 2018, clergy continuing education funds were awarded to Susanne Watson Epting; and to St. Luke's-Cedar Falls for supply coverage in sabbatical of rector.

Engaging All Disciples (2018-19)

Engaging All Disciples - Events Traci Ruhland Petty, coordinator

Building on the momentum started from the Revivals in 2017 and Growing Iowa Leaders' days in 2018, churches have continued to meet in their same clusters and spend a day together, the focus of 2019 being "Engaging All Disciples". By the time of convention, 19 of the 21 clusters will have had their Engaging All Disciples day – a day of reflection, celebration, and/or shared collaboration and engagement with each other. The days have looked different in every cluster of churches, and have included topics like: learning how to invite others, sharing our faith and stories, touring historical places, celebrating the power of prayer, discerning our gifts, and mapping the congregants and ministry areas in the community. It has been exciting to see what each day brings, and the fellowship and spirit that is present at these days and in the lives of participants. Thank you to the participants, hosts, speakers, facilitators, and everyone who has made these days possible.

Engaging All Disciples - Cohorts Ellen Bruckner, coordinator

As the Diocese moves through these three years from Revival 2017 to Growing Iowa Leaders (2018) to, Engaging All Disciples in 2019/2020, there is a focus on being sent into the world to share the Good News of God's love for all. The Cohorts, or learning communities, emerged from topics most requested during the Growing Iowa Leaders days. Seven areas of learning were identified: Engaging Our Stories; Engaging New Generations of Faith; Engaging Creative Worship; Engaging our Resources; Engaging Our Neighbors; Engaging Discipleship; and Engaging Justice through Public Policy.

Each of these topics formed a Cohort which began its journey at the Summer Ministries School and Retreat in June. Each of the Cohorts has a coach who is coaching each of the participants in the development and carrying out of a ministry plan in their own place.

Coaches check in at least once a month (for eight months) with their Cohort and the participants in the Cohort work on their ministry project in their own time and place. We hope to be developing communities of practice with each of these cohorts – networks of people focused on similar topics of ministry and building a relationship that will support each of them. People do know there are others with similar calls across the diocese and are now in touch with some of these practitioners through the Cohort. Cohorts will meet formally until May 2020. We are grateful for the generous gift to the Engaging All Disciples work that has allowed for these cohorts to happen.

Diocesan Officers:

Chancellor Mr. William Graham

The chancellor has consulted with the Bishop, his staff and other individuals on matters of legal significance, as appropriate, and has assisted with legal matters, as necessary.

Diocesan Coordinators/Resources:

Altar Guild Ms. Martha Hippee, Director

The Diocesan Altar Guild Loan Closet was delighted to be able to send home with Bishop Peni of Nzara cassocks and albs that many lowa churches had donated. Also, when Bishop Scarfe visited Nzara he took with him a large number of stoles from the Loan Closet.

The Diocesan Altar Guild was pleased to provide items for the worship space and service at the Summer Ministry School and Retreat in Grinnell, thanks to Jeanne Roland's good and indefatigable work.

The Diocesan Altar Guild ordered and prepared the chrism oils that were distributed to the clergy following Chrism Mass during holy week.

Office of Disaster Preparedness & Response The Rev. Holly Scherff

The U.S. continues to see and feel the effects of global warming in 2019. The Midwest fell victim to record breaking flooding, the West coast endured ravaging fires, and as I write this, the South East is preparing for hurricane Dorian to strike.

Natural disaster's as they are called are no longer natural, or normal. They grow in intensity every year as we continue to neglect our duty of being good stewards of God's creation, and the forecast for the next several decades is heart wrenching.

In March I attended a Disaster Relief Training in Chicago sponsored by Episcopal Relief and Development. (No longer referred to as ERD). Upon my return home we were in the midst of a recordbreaking flood that caused the death of thousands of cattle and hogs and the loss of grain and farmland. My training was used immediately and the best part about that is the team of Episcopal Relief and Development were with me every step of the way. The difficult issue with this particular flood is the many breaches in the levee system, which means the river goes where it wants to go. Homes remained underwater for months and are now beyond repair. Roads were completely washed away making it possible only by boat to get to homes to retrieve pets or care for surviving livestock. And now that the water has receded the challenge is even greater.

I have been in constant contact with the Fremont County Emergency Manager asking how we can help. Fortunately, a disaster brings out the generosity and compassion of many around the world. Unfortunately, there is always another disaster around the corner. All the major players concerning disaster relief were present within days and stayed for months. I waited to see who fell through the cracks of the system. For example, I was given the name of a family whose home was not affected by the flooding, but the husband was unable to get to his job because the road was gone. His job would be waiting for him once the road reopened, but that would take months. The loss of income was stressful, and aid was minimal. We, the Episcopal Diocese of Iowa, were able to help with gas and grocery gift cards.

As time goes on the needs have changed. We purchased good clean furniture and household items from a local auction house that are being stored and are available for free to those affected. The major need at present is housing. Many displaced families have been living in campers in nearby campgrounds that will be closing in early October.

As we look to the future at increasing devastation due to climate change, we must prepare ourselves and our communities. Our friends and partners at Episcopal Relief and Development have posed the question that we all need to consider. "What if we thought about disaster planning as connecting with God? Just as God remembers those who mourn, are brokenhearted and disenfranchised, we can too. Let us be intentional in remembering those who are most in need in our communities, especially during disasters and extreme weather. After all, God is in the details."

Flooding in SW lowa was not all that happened in lowa this year but, where I am in SW lowa, it is what I was involved with. I apologize to those on the East side or any other part of the state that endured a disaster of any sort for not seeming to be concerned. This is where I need help. It would be wonderful to have a disaster coordinator in each of the four corners of the state. If you or someone in your congregation has a passion for such a project, for helping those that fall the cracks of the system, please contact me at scherffh@gmail.com. I would love the help. A disaster is overwhelming, emotionally and monetarily. It would be easier with a local support network.

As for recovery work, a team from lowa traveled to the panhandle of Florida in February to help after hurricane Michael ravaged the area in October of 2018. The group worked on four properties with plumbing, electricity, painting, sheet rock, granite counter installation, trim, wallboard and door installation, fence repair, general grounds cleanup, and more. They partnered with St. Michael's Episcopal Church on Sanibel Island in Florida under the leadership of Jerry Davenport. I am grateful for their willingness to serve where and when they are needed (although going to Florida in February from lowa does not seem like a daunting sacrifice).

The US Disaster Program, Episcopal Relief and Development, offer many resources and support that we can draw from. It is our responsibility as Christians to assist those on the margins, those that no one else sees.

Christ has no body now on earth but yours; no feet but yours. Yours are the eyes through which the compassion of Christ must look out on the world. Yours are the feet with which He is to go about doing good. Yours are the hands with which He is to bless His people.' We must be prepared so that we may be of the most use. Won't you please join me?

Jubilee Ministry

A Jubilee Ministry Center is a congregation, an ecumenical cluster with an Episcopal presence, or an agency with connections to the Episcopal Church, already engaged in mission and ministry among and with poor and oppressed people. Each program comes out of the history of its community. The network of Jubilee Ministry Centers is coordinated by the Jubilee Ministry Office at The Episcopal Church headquarters in New York City.

Ministry Development Teams Ellen Bruckner, Ministry Development Team Coordinator

Ministry Development Teams have been active in the Diocese of Iowa for over 20 years. There are currently 7 teams who share in the leadership of their congregations. Each of the teams has its unique style and form. The development of ministry in their congregations is a common thread through all these teams, a thread they share with leadership in every congregation in the diocese. Each of our teams committed to the team concept and studied together rather than selecting a priest through the Episcopal Church search process.

There have been several different formation/training programs used in lowa. Currently we are using a curriculum based on competencies. The team determines what skills/know-ledge/ability are currently in the team and then make plans to fill in the areas that need some work.

There has been work done across The Episcopal Church on developing formation/training experiences for clergy and lay. There is no longer just one way for a person to move toward leadership. The Commission on Ministry oversees the formation and training for the teams.

The teams try to check in with each other via the internet at least quarterly. Each of the teams works to interact with its current demographic reality and remain an active presence in the community in which they minister.

Sexual Misconduct Prevention: Safeguarding God's Children & Safeguarding God's People Amy Mellies, Diocesan Coordinator

Safeguarding God's Children

The diocesan-approved child abuse prevention education and training, Safeguarding God's Children, is required for all who regularly work with or around children or youth. All vestry members and clergy must be trained as well.

Safeguarding God's People

Safeguarding God's People: Prevention of Sexual Harassment & Sexual Exploitation in Communities of Faith is required of any person who engages in, supervises or makes decisions involving pastoral relationships including, but not limited to, Diocesan Standing Committee, Board of Directors, Commission on Ministry and congregational vestry members; clergy; anyone providing counseling, pastoral care, spiritual direction or guidance, ministration of any sacrament; licensed ministers such as pastoral leaders, worship leaders, preachers, Eucharistic visitors and catechists; persons in the ordination process and all paid employees.

The Diocese of Iowa submitted two UTO grant applications for consideration in 2019, one on behalf of a project in Iowa and the other in conjunction with an overseas companion diocese that is part of the greater Anglican Communion, as allowed by UTO guidelines. Both grants were among the 33 grants awarded this year.

"Nzara Pre-Natal Birth Clinic" grant was funded with a \$28,520.00 award. The upgrades to the existing clinic will offer sanitary conditions for pregnant women.

The Faith and Grace Garden, at St. Timothy's in West Des Moines was awarded a \$10,604.67 UTO grant to build a greenhouse. This garden brings people from multiple faiths and cultures together to grow food for the food insecure.

We in lowa give thanks to God for the thankful giving of many across our Church and for the recipients' work enriching the lives of many through the vision in each of the proposals.

Diocesan Lifelong Christian Formation

Education For Ministry (EfM) The Rev. John Doherty

This is the THIRTY THIRD year for Education for Ministry in this Diocese! The Diocese of Iowa is a supporting diocese of EfM which provides training for a coordinator and financial incentives for people registering. As of January 2019, I have become the new diocesan coordinator. The Rev. Anne Moats Williams has given many years of service to this diocese as coordinator. She is also an EfM trainer and mentor. This year there were 43 active students with five active groups: Anamosa (Anamosa State Penitentiary), Cedar Falls (St. Luke's), Cedar Rapids (Christ), Des Moines (St. Paul's), and Iowa City (Trinity). The Diocese had 7 active mentors in 2018-19 but just certified a new mentor. There are 11 inactive mentors. There have been over 300 individual graduates from EfM, most of whom are resident in the Diocese. 5 people graduated in May 2018. Since the program began in this Diocese in 1986, there have been at least 39 individuals who have been ordained/certified either to the permanent deaconate, to Canon 9 priesthood, Ministry Development Teams or have gone on to 3-year seminary training after they participated in EfM. There are countless members of the laity who have had their ministries enhanced and have gone on to serve in leadership positions in their parishes, communities, and diocese. Some individuals who have been certified/ordained under the Ministry Development Team program in our Diocese are now students in EfM.

The Anamosa State Penitentiary group is starting its sixteenth year. It has impacted sixty-seven (67) men, and graduated twenty. This year 11 men are in the group, six are mid-program, and five are year one members.

The EfM curriculum helps to develop an individual's spirituality and encourage mutual ministry. It also fosters evangelism in that it prepares individuals with the academic and theological background go out into the world and be witnesses to their faith.

In lowa there are two individuals who are trainers for the EfM program. One is the retired judicatory head of the Disciples of Christ, The Rev. Dr. Richard Guentert and the other is The Rev. Anne Moats Williams. In that capacity, they each travel to all parts of the country to train mentors in the EfM process.

In August of 2019, we held a mentor training for 2 groups, foundation and formation, both of which had 7 enrollees coming from Iowa, Illinois, Georgia, and Nebraska. Contact me for more information or to give a presentation at your church: jdoherty@iowaepiscopal.org

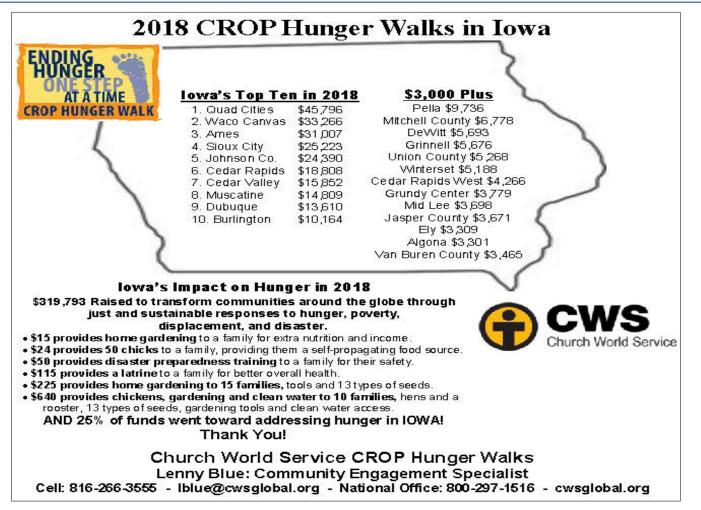
Summer Ministry School & Retreat - 2019 The Rev. Ruth Ratliff & The Rev. Jeanie Smith, Co-Directors

This year's Summer Ministry School and Retreat collaborated with the diocesan Engaging All Disciples initiative to offer tracks related to the seven EAD cohorts being formed in the diocese. Each track involved participants in "Engaging" in one of these topics: Our Stories: Evangelism; New Generations of Faith; Creative Expressions of Worship; Our Resources; The Way of Love and Discipleship; Our Neighbors and Neighborhoods: Missions; and Justice through Public Policy. Ellen Bruckner, coordinator of the EAD initiative, and Meg Wagner, missioner for communications and reconciliation, recruited outstanding facilitators for each of these sessions. Among them were Alan Yarborough, Communications Coordinator for the Episcopal Church. He also opened SMSR on Friday evening with a program on Civil Discourse.

Other SMSR tracks added to the depth and variety of SMSR offerings: Christ Within: Mind-Body-Spirit Practices presented by the Rev. Catherine Quehl-Engle; "Mortal, Can These Bones Live?": Hope In Today's Weary World, presented by the Rev. Jean McCarthy; and "The Parables of Jesus: Exploring New Meanings," presented by Paul Muhle. There was also an increase this year in the number of SMSR participants enrolling for their own solo retreat.

Worship services during SMSR this year used the Australian Prayer Book, a book of Celtic Prayers, and a Eucharistic Prayer focused on creation care written by Jennifer Latham of St. Paul's Grinnell.

As with every year at SMSR, those present had lots of time for visiting with friends and colleagues, for dialoging with new acquaintances, for sharing God's love with one another. This remarkable weekend is such a treasured part of our Diocesan life for good reason. Please consider joining us in 2020 the weekend of June 26-28.

Iowa Religious Media Services (IRMS) - Finding the Simple Way Sharon E. Strohmaier, Executive Director

It is with feelings of both accomplishment and sadness that I write my final report to the Episcopal Convention on behalf of Iowa Religious Media Services. As you should be aware, by the end of this year IRMS will be closing its doors following 33½ years of service to the Episcopal Diocese of Iowa and its covenanting denominational partners in Iowa and the Upper Midwest. On this day, I recall a quote from a book on creative problem solving: "The quality of the original idea determines the ultimate outcome." Whenever I am seeking a solution to a complicated problem, I return to this concept and never settle on my first idea. I wait for a more refined and elegant idea to appear, which it always does. This is the nature of creative problem solving. This is the way I have learned to identify the best ideas, those that are well-thought-out, elegant and simple. Long-considered and well-researched, IRMS was such an excellent idea.

It took seven years of planning and dreaming to bring the idea of IRMS to fruition. Our mission at the beginning, as it is at the end, has remained the unchanged: to provide local congregations with quality Christian education resources all vetted for the mainline theological perspective. When it became apparent that a wealth of newly produced and innovative media was being developed to support religious education, the IRMS steering committee advanced a concept that was both timely and remarkable. Timely because with the introduction of video recordings, there was a need for churches to access an organized collection of media developed in a simple, yet comprehensive way, designed expressly for local churches. The actual founding of IRMS was remarkable because the then eight denominations all agreed to covenant its support within a relatively short period of time, thus ensuring broad participation. Through IRMS, the denominations and churches had a simple way to locate the resources they needed. Over the past 33½ years, IRMS has continued to help congregations find the simplest way to undergird Christian education.

Following my hiring 18½ years ago, IRMS staff and volunteers completely re-tooled the IRMS office processes and reorganized the collection, to better serve our clients whose needs were broadening

to include more resources on social justice, racism, climate change, personal development, family life and spirituality. The result was a leaner and meaner IRMS designed to help churches express their religious life throughout the greater community. Some of this was driven by an increased understanding of good stewardship on the part of churches who wanted to share resources with one another. Some of this was an expression of my heartfelt belief that every penny IRMS received came from someone's tithe or offering. This sacred view of shared resources has been a guiding force for IRMS during my tenure.

For 18½ years, IRMS and the Diocese have walked together on this simple way. During my tenure at IRMS, we have shared eighteen Annual Conventions and eighteen Summer Ministry Schools and Retreats, where IRMS provided resources for a number of track leaders. I watched Bishop Alan Scarf re-energize the Diocese of Iowa, bringing both Revival and Renewal and an emphasis on the viability of the small church. And, in the process, I have purchased way too much English toffee from the fine folks at Sioux City St. Thomas!

Working with many churches, I have gotten to know so many of you over the last 18 years. I have heard stirring speeches and impassioned discussions. The individual whom I have come to know the best is Episcopal representative to the IRMS board and board treasurer Rev. Jeanie Smith. She is the only person from the board who has been involved with IRMS even longer than I, and she is as responsible as I am for maintaining the good stewardship that undergirds IRMS financial resources. Thank you, Jeanie, for all your heavy lifting.

There will not be an IRMS display at the 167th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese this October, but I know that the work that IRMS has done within the Diocese will continue to ripple out into the churches and communities we have served. Thank you for walking with me on this unique path and for allowing IRMS to help you find the simple way to quality resources. IRMS has indeed been a stellar demonstration of the concept that "the quality of the original idea determines the ultimate outcome." As the churches of the Episcopal Diocese continue to seek relevance, may you discern other simple ways to be the church in Iowa in the 21st century.

VOTING PROCEDURES FOR 167th ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF IOWA

Voting on Saturday, October 26, 2019 will be done electronically between the hours of 10:30 and 2pm using password protection to ensure only one vote per Certified Delegate is counted. In order to vote, Delegates must in attendance at Convention during those hours. Paper ballots will not be used, so voting may only take place online from a personal device or using the voting kiosks available at Convention. Votes are counted using the Hare Transferable Ballot system.

EXPLANATION OF HARE TRANSFERABLE BALLOT

The Hare Transferable Vote System is a means of achieving elections without the necessity for multiple ballots. It achieves an election in two ways:

- 1. By reducing the percentage of votes required to declare an election and
- 2. By successive transfers of counted votes in a prescribed manner until an election is achieved.

Step one in the counting process is to count the first choice candidates on all ballots. Any candidate who is first choice for the quota number will be elected.

The quota number is the number of valid votes cast divided by the number of positions to be filled plus one and then adding one to the quotient, disregarding any fractions. Any person receiving the quota number of votes is declared elected.

Example: 250 valid votes and 3 people to be elected. Divide 250 by 4 equaling 62.5, then add one to 62 to equal 63, the quota required for election. In a majority election, it would take 126 votes to elect each person to be elected.

For any unfilled positions, the next step is to take from the bottom of the pile of each elected candidate the excess number of ballots over the quota and to transfer those ballots to the next expressed choice on those ballots.

Each transfer ballot is marked with the count number "(1st, 2nd, etc) count, transfers".

If there are no further choices expressed on the ballot, the ballot becomes nontransferable and is eliminated from further counting.

If positions remain unfilled after the excess transfers, the lowest ranking candidate in number of votes is eliminated and the ballots being counted for that candidate will be transferred to the next expressed choice. This transfer and elimination process is continued until an election is achieved.

When the election is by orders, the same process is followed except the ballots of each order are counted separately, but when the lowest ranking candidate is eliminated that candidate is eliminated from both orders.

The Hare system is not a majority vote system except when there are only 2 candidates for one position. In all other elections, less than a majority of votes is required for an election and the larger the number of positions to be filled the smaller the percentage of votes required to achieve an election.

Since it takes less than a majority to fill multiple positions, it is more likely that a diverse group will be elected to fill these positions.

THE RULES OF ORDER 167th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Iowa

- 1. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing, or shall afterwards stand up, except to address the Chair.
- 2. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Roll of Members shall be called, and the minutes of the preceding day read; but the same may be dispensed with, by majority vote of the Convention to be decided without debate.
- 3 a. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing at the request of the President, presented to the Secretary; and no motion shall be considered to be before the Convention unless seconded.
 b. A Committee on Dispatch of Business shall be appointed to which any report or resolution may
 - be referred for consideration and action.
- 4. If the question under debate contains several distinct propositions, the same shall be divided, at the request of any member, and a vote taken separately except that a motion to strike out and insert shall be indivisible.
- 5. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received unless to lay it upon the table, to take a vote thereon at a time certain, to postpone to a time certain, to postpone it indefinitely, or commit it or amend it; and motion for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. Any motion to lay a resolution upon the table shall require a two-thirds majority vote. If a motion to lay on the table an amendment be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no amendment had been offered. The motion to lay upon the table, to take vote at a time certain and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.
- 6. There shall be no debate upon a motion to refer to any Standing Committee a resolution then first offered to the Convention and properly referable to such Committee; but the member offering such resolution may speak five (5) minutes in explanation of its purpose. Any motion to refer a resolution to a committee no directly answerable to the Convention, shall require a two-thirds majority vote. Also there shall be no debate on a motion to recommit to a Committee, but without instructions, any report of such Committee than before the Convention. Every resolution offered for the immediate action of the Convention shall be considered at once, unless reference be requested. If reference be requested by any member, such resolution shall be referred to the appropriate Standing Committee or if in the opinion of the President, there be no such Standing Committee, then a Special Committee of such members as the President shall designate.
- 7. When a motion or proposition is under consideration, a motion to amend and a motion to amend the amendment, shall be in order, and it shall also be in order to offer a further amendment by way of substitute to which the amendment may be offered, but which shall not be voted on until the original matter is perfected; but either may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the second before amendment or decision is had thereon. No proposition not germane to the subject under consideration shall be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 8. In all questions decided numerically, the motion to reconsider must be made by a member and seconded by another, who voted in the majority; or, in case of equal division by those who voted in the negative; and, in case of vote by Orders, where there is a concurrence of both Orders, a motion to reconsider shall be made by the concurrence of three (3) members of either Order, or both Orders, voting in the majority; and in case of non-concurrence of Orders, the motion to reconsider shall come from two (2) members of that Order which gave the majority in the negative, and in either case, a motion to reconsider shall be seconded by two (2) members of either or both Orders without regard to their previous vote. And all motions to reconsider shall be made and seconded on the day the vote is taken.
- 9. Nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese, for Deputies to the General Convention, for Deputies to the Synod of the Sixth Province, for Treasurer of the Diocese, for Directors of the Episcopal Corporation, for members of the Diocesan Council, for members of such other Boards and Commissions as the Bishop may specify, shall be made on the first day of the session of the

Convention and before the recess. Such nominations may be made from the floor of the Convention, or handed in writing to the Secretary. In case of there being no more nominations to fill offices than necessary to fill such office, a ballot cast, after proper motion, by the Secretary of the Convention shall be considered a ballot required by the Canon.

- 10. The Secretary of the Convention shall instruct the Convention in preparation of ballots for the various elections, which ballots shall contain the names of all persons nominated in each election and each elector shall vote for the nominees they choose in accordance with the procedures under the Hare Transferable Vote System. There shall be an elections committee appointed by the President, consisting of not less than two (2) and not more than five (5) Clerics and the same number of Lay members, members of the Convention, who shall appoint the necessary clerical and lay members of said committee to receive the ballots of the Clerical Order, the remaining Clergy and Lay members to receive the ballots of the Lay Order. The Secretary of the Convention shall deliver to this Committee two (2) lists, one containing the names of those entitled to vote in the Clerical Order, the other containing the names of those nominated appear upon the proper list. All elections in the Convention shall be by ballot as above provided unless the Rule be suspended in accordance with Rule 19. When the elections committee is ready to report, its report shall be presented first then the votes of the Lay Order.
- 11. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received in course, and without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the Convention. All reports recommending or requiring an action or expression of opinion by the Convention shall be accomplished by resolution of the action of the Convention thereon.
- 12. All questions of order shall be decided by the Chair, without debate; but any member may appeal from such decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once, without express leave of the Convention.
- 13. The names of the movers to resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.
- 14. Every member who shall be in the Convention when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless an apparent conflict of interest be present in the question under consideration.
- 15. While the Chair is putting any question, the members shall continue in their seats, and shall not hold any private discourse.
- 16. When any member is about to speak or deliver any matter to the Convention, each member shall, with due respect, be addressed to the Chair, and confined strictly to the point in debate.
- 17. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 18. Resolutions must be presented to the Secretary of the Convention at least forty (40) days prior to the Convention. The Secretary shall cause same to be duplicated and distributed to each parish and mission of this Diocese prior to the Convention. The Committee on Resolutions shall then separate submitted resolutions into Consent and Debate Calendars. Resolutions on the Consent Calendar shall receive no debate and simply be voted on as presented. Resolutions may be moved from the Consent Calendar to the Debate Calendar by vote of twenty-five (25) members of the Convention. The exceptions to this process are that the Convention may at any time consider given resolutions submitted from the floor, providing that each resolution thus submitted receives the necessary majority vote to suspend the rule, as provided in Rule 19; the Committee on Credentials and the Committee on the Dispatch of Business may submit from the floor such resolutions as required to conduct the business of the Convention; and the Resolutions Committee may present to the Convention such courtesy Resolutions as it deems appropriate.
- 19. No motion is in order which imposes financial responsibilities on this diocese, whether by motion to amend the proposed annual budget or change the proposed program of the Diocese, unless that motion includes provision and plans for funding same. The President shall rule on any such motion with advice from the Chancellor, the Treasurer, the Diocesan Finance Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means, or any other committee or persons s/he thinks prudent. The President may recess the Convention for a time for such consultation if s/he thinks it appropriate. The ruling of the President may be appealed and overturned by a 2/3 vote of both Orders.

- 20. All materials to be submitted to the Secretary for duplication and distribution to both the clerical and lay delegates of the Convention must be received in the Diocesan Office no later than forty (40) days prior to Convention. This would include, but not be limited to, agendas, budget reports, committee/commission reports, nominations, resolutions, instructions regarding parking, etc.
- 21. No rule shall be suspended unless with the assent of a majority of the members present.
- 22. The Rules of Order of the Convention shall be in force in the ensuing Convention until the organization thereof, and until they are amended or repealed by said Convention.
